

"The Cheap Production of Milk," was the subject of a timely address, brimful of information, given by Mr. Glendenning which brought forth a general discussion, and which proved most beneficial. Mr. Glendenning is a practical farmer, who has made a success of his calling, speaks from experience, and therefore his addresses are always listened to with great interest. He said that the farmers in this district did not take advantage of the opportunity given them in Kingston, when so much milk was required, both in the homes and the dairy school. He knew of one case, where milk was shipped some 200 miles to the dairy school. All this money should be kept in the district.

The speaker urged that the cows be given the best of care. One great drawback was that farmers allowed cows to go dry at this season of the year, and remain so until spring, so that the cost would be small. This was one of the greatest mistakes.' Dairying should be carried on every day in the year. There were better cows in Ontario, than people imagined. One great trouble was that they were not being fed well. 
