LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—About 1,200 head of cattle, including 223 sheep and lambs and 831 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. The butchers were out strong and trade was good with advancing prices all round. The price of pretty good cattle are from one-quarter to a cent per lb. higher than they were ten days ago, and even the common stock have been bringing considerably higher prices. There is a scarcity of small stuff and both calves and lambs brought higher rates. Prime beefs sold at 40c. to 50c. per lb., and they were not extra; pretty good cattle sold at 35c. to nearly 40c., and the common stock from 25c. to 30c. per lb. Grass-fed calves sold at 35c. to 40c. per lb. Sheep sold at 35c. to 38c. and the lambs at 5c. to 5 1/2c. per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold at about 6 1/2c. per lb., old sows at about 5c. do.

East Buffalo, N.Y., Dec. 7.—Cattle—Receipts, 1,250 head; active and higher; prime steers, \$6.25 to \$6.50; shipping, \$5.50 to \$6.25; butchers, \$5 to \$5.50; hogs, \$4.50 to \$5.25; cows, \$3.50 to \$4.75; bulls, \$3 to \$4.25; stockers and feeders, stock heifers, and fresh cows, and springers, none here. Veal receipts 150 head, active, \$7 to \$10.
