The Very Latest Culled from All Over The World.

Alexander J. Ross, a native of East Williams, died suddenly, aged seventy-one.

A colony of 600 Germans is to be located in the Peace River country next spring.

The liberals who are organizing a club for Toronto, decided to call it the Sydenham.

Congress has passed a bill designed to suppress "bucket shops" in the district of Columbia.

Thomas McBrien is dying of injuries sustained in a fall from a warehouse, it is alleged he was robbing.

The latest news from the front of the Grand Trunk Pacific is that the Battle river bridge is completed.

The Simpson Brick company, Hamilton, has been purchased by the Hamilton Brick company, capitalized at \$40,000.

W. L. M. King, M.P., has left Ottawa for China, to take part in the international congress on the opium traffic.

Robbers dynamited the safe of the First National Bank at Eufaula, Okla., and escaped with a sum said to be \$15,000.

J. Mackinder, stated in London that Canada was in danger of forming a political coalition with the United States.

Justice Britton granted a stay of proceedings in West Peterboro election petition, pending the final decision on the preliminary objections.

Justice Falconbridge issued a winding-up order in the case of the Ontario Sugar company of Toronto, which has its factory at Broslin.

The Canadian Northern railway has gained an entrance into the United States by taking over the Duluth, Rainy Lake and Winnipeg railway.

Thornton J. Hains is on trial at Flushing, N.Y., on a charge of being accessory to the killing of William E. Annis, who was shot by Hains' brother.

Rev. Victor Henning, Winnipeg, was found guilty of carnal knowledge of a little girl, the daughter of a parishioner, and was sentenced to two years in penitentiary.

It is officially announced that a marriage engagement has been arranged between the Earl of Granard and Miss Beatrice Mills, the daughter of Ogden Mills, of New York.

Local option contests throughout Manitoba under the new act, are being held to-day. Votes are cast against local option will be taken in twenty-four towns and municipalities.

At a meeting of the council for further consideration of the Niagara power scheme as it affects Windsor, 1,200 horse power was fixed on as the amount the city will be able to use.

At Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., navigation for the season of 1909 is practically closed. Both the Canadian and Michigan locks have commenced the work of laying up for the winter.

While eating dinner at his home in Altmar, N.Y., a piece of roast pork became lodged in the windpipe of George A. Mahaffey, and he choked to death. Mr. Mahaffey was sixty years old.

Windsor council will give Alexander Bartlett, Windsor's aged police magistrate, a public reception in the council chamber, on December 30th, in recognition of his fifty-one years of public service.

President Roosevelt has applied to the Belgian government through the American legation, for a hunting permit in Belgium territory. This will be granted. It will be issued in 1909, and include all game.

Cruelly bruised and injured from being trampled beneath the feet of horses, Mrs. Peter E. McKeerrell, wife of a prosperous farmer near Chatham, Ont., is in a serious condition.

Thomas McBrien, alleged shop breaker, arrested after falling from the third storey window of a front street warehouse, Toronto, which it was alleged he was robbing, died at St. Michael's hospital this afternoon.

French Canadian members of the Church of St. Mary on the Lake, at North Bay, are indignant over remarks made by Bishop Scollard. One prominent French Canadian merchant intends to institute an action for \$25,000. Other actions may follow.

At The Hague it is semi-officially announced that one of the Dutch warships has captured another Venezuelan coast guardship, the Mayo, which had been taken as a prize to Curacao. The crew of the Mayo was landed on the Venezuelan shore.

The explosion at Bas Obispo, Panama, was more serious than was at first supposed. Twenty-five bodies have been recovered and it is said there are more in the debris. More than 100 men were injured. The damage done covers fifteen acres.

In defining the tariff bill to be introduced at the spring session of United States congress, the house ways and means committee is to give special consideration to the steel schedule. Charles M. Scamander, the steel magnate, will appear before the committee to-morrow.

Merchants from Kingston, Brockville, Toronto and other places are to appear in Ottawa at the marine enquiry on Wednesday. Officials of the department are cross-examining as to the strong evidence gathered in other places and will furnish interesting matter before Judge Cassels.
