ENGLAND WANTS CANADIAN HOCKEY TEAM.

To Give Exhibitions Over There—The Longboat Dorando Twenty-Six Mile Race in New York This Evening.

"Tom" Phillips has joined the Edmonton hockey team for the Stanley cup games.

Detroit will probably get next year's regatta of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen.

"Y" Cobb has decided to please Mrs. Cobb, and spend the winter in Georgia, rather than on a baseball tour to Japan with the barnstormers.

Varsity captured the soccer championship of Ontario on Saturday, by holding Toronto All Saints to a tie on their margin of two goals from the week before.

Young Corbett and Philip Brook fought ten rounds to a draw in New Orleans, at the Southern Athletic Club, Ty. Cobb, of the Detroit Baseball team.

New York Nationals have traded Catcher Roger Bresnahan to St. Louis for Pitcher Raymond. Outfielder Murray and Catcher Schiel, the last-named now in Cincinnati.

Thirty-five thousand spectators were held in Cardiff on Saturday, when the touring Australian rugby team met their first international defeat, Wales beating them 9 to 0.

Hassan Abdallah, the Turk, and Gene Harbuisse, the Peterborough champion, have been matched to meet in England on Sunday, in a bout at catch-as-catch-can, best two in three.

Hayes, who was defeated in Madison Square Garden over a distance equalling that of the Marathon course in England, received \$4,500 as his share of the receipts. The total receipts were nearly \$15,000.

It is expected by his friends, however, that he'll beat the Italian handily, and show that he is the neat runner that his amateur performances in Canada indicate.

The Burns-Johnson fight is to take place in Sydney, Australia, on the December 20th, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon. The result will be known in Toronto, Christmas night, as we are between fourteen and sixteen hours ahead of Sydney in the matter of time. THE LATE GEORGE WELBANKS

He Was Prominent in South Marysburg.

Pictou, Dec. 15.—A man prominent in South Marysburg, filling public offices for over half a century, George A. Welbanks passed away Saturday in the ninth year of his age. He was a capable farmer, township assessor for over half a century and Justice of the Peace for sixty years.

Mr. Welbanks was born eighty-nine years ago on the family homestead at South Bay. His parents were among the pioneer settlers. He was left an orphan at an early age. Then he was taken care of by the Abbott family, near Trenton, with whom he remained until he was of age, when he took possession of the homestead at South Bay. The past five years, he had lived retired, being with his two daughters, Mrs. Ansel Richards, Athol, and Mrs. Marshall Macbee, at whose home he died.

In 1847 Mr. Welbanks married Phoebe Minaker, daughter of Andrew Minaker, who numbered one of the very early families at South Bay. Of the seven children, five survive, Mrs. Irvin Hicks, South Bay; George Andrew Welbanks, late of Alberts; Charles Welbanks, New- castle; Mrs. Marshall Macbee, Ridge Road, and Mrs. Ansel Richards, Athol.
