FELL RIGHT IN FRONT OF WHERE J. T. SUTHERLAND WAS SEATED.

"Jim" Writes About the Longboat-Dorando Race—Tells How the Italian Played With the Dago.
 James T. Sutherland, of Kingston, witnessed the Longboat-Dorando race in New York, on Tuesday night. Writing about the contest he says: "It certainly made one feel that it was a grand thing to be a Canadian, and to be able to join heartily in the applause which was showered upon the famous Italian. About 15,000 people jammed the big Madison Square Garden and fully two-thirds were Italian in sentiment, as well as birth. The Italian band played all the popular national airs of Italy and Italians were crazed with joy over their hero, Dorando. That was before 'Long Tom' took his measure.
 "When the men had got under way, for a mile or two, I was quite certain how it would end, and enjoyed the affair considerably more, because of my faith in Longboat. He played with the little Italian like a cat plays with a mouse. First, he allowed Dorando to cut ahead and show off his little red lights to the delight of all. Then when he looked the Dago was not going fast enough to tire himself out, 'Tom' walked into the lead and hit the pace up a bit. Then he would side-step and force Dorando to take the pace again. The Italian's love of applause led him to fall into the wily 'Tom's' trap right along. Well, it just looked to me that Longboat could have beaten him any old time he got ready, and get ready he did in the twenty-fifth mile. It was then that the Italian moved up into the lead, and hit such a pace that after going four laps of the twenty-sixth mile and while yet 1,200 yards from the finish, the Italian topped over, dead to the world, right in front of where I stood.
 "The Indian never gave him a thought, but hit it up for the balance of the distance at a speedier clip than ever. In fact the last two laps he sprinted in a 2:20 manner, and actually took the breath from the spectators, who thought that if Dorando succumbed, the Indian also must be nearly all in, but he showed them that he was as fresh and speedy as a 100-yard sprinter.
 "I tell you the Union Jack souvenir flags began to sell fast when, because everybody likes to be with the winner, the Italian colony was broken. Their idols shattered in the dust. Canada deserves to do well by such noble sons as Longboat, Sherring, Kerr, etc., who place her name on the highest pinnacle of fame. It certainly thrilled me through and through to see the Indian boy with his maple leaf on his racing shirt, with head high and shoulders erect, swinging around that arena and proclaimed by all the best judges to be the greatest long-distance runner in the world.
 "The three-Tom combination could not be beaten. 'Tom' Enoch, the trainer, 'Tom' Flanagan, the manager, 'Tom' Longboat, the wonder.
 "They say in New York, that it took a Longboat to 'top' the Italian into the 'dead' sea.
 "One New York paper, the Globe, says: 'Canada has no flag, but it has a great runner.' Some sporting writers on New York papers must draw salaries for their ignorance of other countries."

GRAFT IN RUSSIA.
 Removing Difficulties in Army Officer's Transfer.
 A young Russian officer wished to be transferred from another regiment and took his request in person to one of the lights of the Russian general staff. That powerful officer, shook his head and declared the matter very difficult to arrange—almost impossible. Then his chance fell suddenly upon the shoulders of his visitor, the senior officer said that lieutenant's shoes were not nearly good enough for an officer, and that he would have them made for him. He strongly advised him to buy a pair of shoes of a shoemaker whose address he gave. Then, telling his visitor to return in eight days, he dismissed him. The latter was clever enough to realize that he could not return without the new shoes, so he hurried to the shoemaker. On hearing what the lieutenant could have the shoes in five days for the sum of \$250. Much astonished, the officer went to a comrade for advice. He was told to pay half of this sum at once and the rest when his shoes were finished. This the officer did, and wearing his new boots, he duly kept his appointment with the general staff officer and learned to his joy that all the "grave difficulties" in the way of his transfer had been successfully removed.

SMOKED NEAR IT. HOTEL SHED AT ABBOTSFORD, B. C., BLOWN UP.

Abbotsford, B. C., Dec. 18.—Archie Baxter, aged fifty employed at the Abbotsford Hotel, was fatally injured by an explosion of gasoline. He was in charge of the hotel's lighting when he visited the gasoline shed, a short distance from the hotel. At five o'clock a terrific explosion was heard. The shed was immediately in flames, and Baxter was reached with great difficulty. He died at six o'clock in the morning. He had lived in Abbotsford for some time and had been employed by the Abbotsford Mill company.

TO BUY O'BRIEN.
 Spokane Interests Desirous of Purchasing Mises.
 Toronto World: "The general feeling among yachtsmen here is that the Canadians are right in their opinion that the Seneca is not eligible. That yacht does not comply with the scantling restrictions, and it would be unfair to race her against a yacht that does."
 After hearing the report of the futile mission to Rochester a joint meeting of the Toronto executive and sailing committees decided to withdraw the Royal Canadian Yacht Club's challenge to a race for the Canada's cup next year, and Rochester was notified of the action.
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 "Tom" Phillips is to get \$600 from Edmonton for the Stanley cup games, win or lose, or \$800 if the challengers win the trophy. There is no doubt but that Ottawa will make a strenuous effort to keep Phillips in the east, but he says there is no chance of all after the Stanley cup series.
 Quite a number of United States horsemen, especially those in the states of New York, and Michigan, will have to forego the pleasure of Canadian ice-racing this winter, on account of the embargo placed upon horses from the other side of the line on account of the foot and mouth disease. This will leave the field practically to Canadian-owned animals.
 Dorando Pietro was first heard of in the Olympic Marathon, in which he collapsed within a short distance of the finish. The only other run of note he made was on November 25th, when he met Hayes over the same indoor track and the same distance, and beat him in 2 hours, 44 minutes and 20.2 seconds, Hayes' time being 2:45:05-1.5. That time of Dorando was 11 minutes better than Hayes' Olympic Marathon time.
 New York Times: "The last two laps were covered at a remarkable rate of speed, and when the pistol announced the finish of the thrilling contest, Longboat was overwhelmed with congratulations and cheered to the echo. He was not the tottering Indian that quit in London, but the embodiment of the true athlete, and he lived up to the best traditions of the Indian race. He returned to his dressing-room comparatively fresh."
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 New York Telegraph: "The wallowing Indian gave that poor Capri boxer by a shame, an outrage, and a disgrace. He ran circles around poor Dorando at any time after the fifteenth mile. He passed Dorando whenever he pleased, simply by slipping his feet a few inches farther on each stride. Dorando never caught him, but when he had tired of stealing Dorando's goal, Longboat would step to one side in an 'after you, Alphonse' fashion, and let the Italian take the lead again."
 Dorando is wanted back in England to run against Shrub and the first four men in the professional Marathon of October 10th, which was promoted by the London Evening News, and ran over the course in the Olympic Marathon. A purse of £350 was offered, but Dorando is doing so well in the way of gate money on this side that he declined. The first four and their times in the Evening News race were: H. Sirret, France, 2:37:23; P. White, Ireland, 2:40:15 2-5; J. Heywood, England, 2:41:10 4-5; A. Cradington, England, 2:52:17 1-5. All of these times are better than those of Dorando and Hayes in the Olympic.

 "The Laughing Ghoul" a Critic Calls Him—Toronto Yacht Club Withdraws Challenge to Rochester.
 Longboat's share as a result of the New York race will be close to \$4,000.
 An effort is being made in Sydney to prevent the Burns-Johnson fight set for December 26th.
 "The Laughing Ghoul" is how a New York critic described Longboat as he dogged the footsteps of Dorando.
 Longboat says he will run any man in the world now, any distance above fifteen miles. "I am after Shrub now," says Longboat.
 Shrub, the great English professional runner, may race Longboat over the Marathon distance at New York on the night of January 9th.
 The secret of Longboat's victory lies in the fact that the Indian obeyed orders. He was told to dog the Italian all the way, to go up and worry him occasionally, and to wait for the finish, depending on his well-known great sprint to win out in the final mile.
