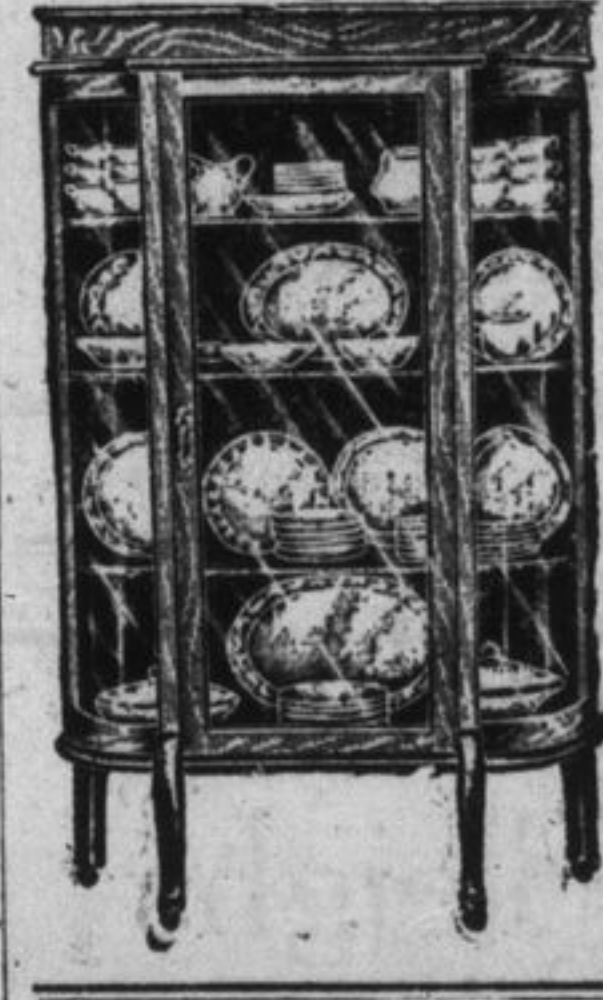
Death At Marysville.
