### THOSE LIKELY TO RUN FOR ALDERMAN IN THE VARIOUS WARDS.

Acclamations in Ontario and Frontenac—It is Possible That Mayor Ross Will Run in Cataraqui or Rideau.

It will not be definitely known who will be aldermanic candidates until nine o'clock this evening, when the usual qualification papers have to be filed with the city clerk.

So far as known at present, Ald. Toye will have Dr. Anglin as opponent in Sydenham ward, but the veteran of twelve years' council service should head the poll, no matter who opposes him.

In St. Lawrence ward, Ald. John Carson is also to be opposed, likely by D. A. Shaw and H. D. Bibby. Ald. Carson says he is glad to have opponents, for he dearly loves to fight. However, he promises to emerge at the head of the poll next Monday evening.

Cataraqui ward will furnish a rather unique contest. There are four nominated for three-year term, and five for one-year term to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Capt. John Gaskin. Ald. Henderson and Ex-Ald. John McKay will fight it out for the three-year term, while John Tweedell may possibly have Mayor Ross as his opponent. This is not certain, however.

In Frontenac ward, Mayor Ross will retire in favor of Ald. McCann, who will get the seat by acclamation, through the neglect of Dr. Campbell's friends to place his name in nomination.

The candidates in Rideau ward are not yet certain. W. R. Clugston will be one, anyway, and the winner at that. He may be opposed by either J. M. Hughes, J. H. Metcalfe or Mayor Ross.

Victoria ward will have a fight between Ald. Graham and Marshall P. Reid. There is a strong rally out there to the side of Mr. Reid, whose chances of election are bright indeed.

There are likely to be school trustee contests in Rideau, Frontenac and Victoria wards.

### WHO STOLE THE HORSE?

P. C. Arniel Did Shooting, But Stealing is Mystery.

On Monday afternoon, P. C. Arniel, humane inspector, was called on to shoot a horse belonging to a man living near the fair grounds. The man wanted the skin of the animal, so highly was the horse prized, and all arrangements were made for the execution. The horse was led over near the fair grounds, where it received the bullet that stopped its sufferings. After the men had examined the animal to be sure that it was dead, the former owner went home to get his wagon to remove the carcass, and the policeman wended his way down town.

In a short time the man returned with his wagon and ropes to remove the body of his horse. He drove up to the place where the animal was last seen, and could not believe his eyes when he could not find it. The first thought that struck him was that the wise horse had only feigned death and was now away seeking a new home. He drove around the fair grounds, but could not find any horse. After a long search some one informed him that while he was gone for his wagon, another party came along loaded the horse on a sleigh and drove away.

### MISSIONARY INSTITUTE.

The Great Advantage of Study Classes.

Yesterday the central committee of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, heard an address from Rev. F. W. Anderson, organizing secretary for Ontario of the Young People's Missionary Movement, whose headquarters are in New York. Its prime object is to furnish literature for spreading mission knowledge, creating libraries, promoting the forward spirit and instructing study classes. Last year 175,000 text books were sold, besides those issued by denominations upon their own lines. The education of the young life was a great foundation for the Laymen's Movement. The annual summer school at Whitby, like those in the United States, had been so well attended, so much appreciated and so helpful to religion that it is proposed to increase this touch with the young folk by study institutes. These will be held in Western Ontario this winter, and they are being proposed for Kingston, Brockville and Belleville for the eastern front. One in Peterboro last May, undenominational as well, was very effective. The students go back home to be leaders, not followers merely.

The central committee heartily commended the plan and proposes an institute for Kingston, Monday, February 1st, and two days following. They ask every young people's society in town, Anglican Juniors and A.Y.P.A., Brotherhood of St. Andrew, Epworth Leagues, Christian Endeavor, Misses Moxley and White will notify these societies to send two delegates, (the presidents and secretaries preferred), to a meeting at Sydenham Street Methodist church on Wednesday evening, January 6th, at 7:30, to plan for the institute and appoint committees. Mr. Anderson addressed several young people's societies during the evening.

### SUDDEN DEATH AT HOTEL.

H. De M. Harvey Passed Away From Heart Failure.

Fort William Paper, December 25th. Taken suddenly ill early yesterday morning with an attack of heart disease, H. De M. Harvey passed away a few minutes after six o'clock, at the St. Louis hotel, in his room. The deceased had not been feeling well for a few days, though he was walking around only the day before. However, early in the morning the night clerk became alarmed at his condition and called the proprietor, Mr. Doyle. A doctor was at once summoned, but his efforts were unavailing and his death supervened in a very short time.

Mr. Harvey was well known locally, having been in this district for years, much of his time having been spent on construction work on the railway, while latterly he had been employed by the Kaministiquia Power company at Kakabeka Falls. His home was at Kingston, Ont., where he has several relatives living. The funeral arrangements are in charge of the Masonic order, deceased being a member of Cataraqui Lodge, No. 91, Kingston.

The remains of the late Harvey De M. Harvey reached the city by Saturday night's express, and were taken at once to the residence of his sister, Mrs. J. R. C. Dobbs, where the funeral services were conducted, Monday, by Dean Farthing and Canon Starr. Mr. Harvey was accorded a Masonic funeral in Fort William, the Masons and all the members of the craft attending in a body.

### Sons of Scotland Concert.

The local Sons of Scotland Camp had a concert and social in their lodge room on Monday, it being the first of a series which they intend holding during the winter months. The chair was taken by the chief, H. Aitken. At the close Rev. Dr. Mackie made a short but witty speech and thanked those, in the name of the camp, who had taken part in the programme. Harry Lawder played a very important part at the concert through the Edison phonograph, under the able management of A. K. Routley.
