Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in any three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate five acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$8.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered sections South of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended on paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS.—Generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 24 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

CLAIMS OF \$165,073 FOR VARIOUS AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS

Filed in the Spokane County Superior Court—One is Against the City For the Death of a School Teacher.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 30.—Claims aggregating \$165,073 for injuries sustained in a series of automobile accidents have been filed in the Spokane county superior court. The largest is against the city of Spokane as the result of a touring car going over a 150-foot bluff the evening of November 15th, when Miss Mary L. Nichols, a school teacher, was killed, and her sisters, Mona Nichols and Clara M. Nichols, and F. C. Chambers, chauffeur, injured. Abuse and lines artists want \$65,273 from John A. Weeks as damages for injuries sustained in being run down by a buzz-wagon, which frightened their team. In the run-away that followed they were thrown out of the vehicle and cut and bruised. John E. Donke, a stenographer, asks H. Gunning to pay \$20,000 for knocking her down with his machine. She was crossing a street when the automobile came around a corner. The front wheels passed over her body and when the engine stopped one of the rear wheels struck her, and Miss Donke says her injuries are permanent.

Has Again Left Church.

Quite a few years ago Rev. G. W. Overbaugh left the Free Methodist church. In 1901 he asked for reinstatement, and the conference asked him to publicly confess his wrong. He declined at that time, moving to Kingston, where he worked in the cotton mill. In 1907 he made confession, was reinstated, given local preachers' license and labored in Prince Edward county.

A few weeks ago he again left the Free Methodist church and nine members of the Fairmount class have gone with him. He is reported as having founded a new set, consisting of seventeen members. At present Mr. Overbaugh and his followers are holding meetings in Josiah Benson's pop barn, only a few rods from the Free Methodist church at Fairmount. These facts are officially set forth in published correspondence.
