LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices That Are Paid at Various Centres.

Montreal, Dec. 28.—About 495 head of butchers' cattle, 65 calves, 403 sheep and lambs and 276 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stock yards this forenoon. Good cattle were rather scarce and sold for nearly one-quarter of a cent per lb. higher than similar cattle sold here a week ago. Trade was exceedingly dull and many of the butchers went to the East End Abattoir, where there were larger supplies of good cattle. Prime steers sold at 41c. to 5c. per lb., but they were not extra; pretty good animals sold at 31c. to near 41c., and the common stock at 21c. to 31c. per lb. Calves sold at 4c. to 5c. per lb. Sheep sold at 31c. to 31c. and the lambs at 51c. to 51c. per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold at about 61c. per lb. The receipts of live stock at this market, during the week were 1,043 cattle, 117 calves, 853 sheep and lambs and 1,422 fat hogs.

Sheep receipts 25,000, market steady to 10c. lower; native, \$2.60 to \$4.50; westerns, \$2.60 to \$4.50; yearlings, \$3 to \$6.25; lambs, native, \$4.50 to \$7.60; western \$4.50 to \$7.60.

Financing A Project.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 30.—Three million dollars will be invested by the Big Bend Transit company, of Spokane, in the construction of an electric railway from this city into the Big Bend wheat belt, going west as far as Miles, Wash., where the Spokane river joins the Columbia river. Spokane and eastern capitalists are financing the project, upon which work will begin early next spring.

Industry For Newfoundland.

Syracuse, N. Y., Dec. 30.—The West Coast Lumber and Pulp Co., Ltd., composed of men in Syracuse and Central New York, have been organized with a capital of \$150,000, to build mills and produce lumber and pulp in Newfoundland. They will start operations at once.

TEMPERANCE REFORM.

Now at the Flood Tide in Australasia. London, Dec. 30.—The Melbourne correspondent of the Chronicle writes that temperance reform in Australasia is at the flood tide. The South Australian legislative assembly has just accepted the most drastic licensed victuallers' bill. Some ideas of the changes which the measure legalizes may be gathered from the following facts: It closes all hotels on parliamentary election days, federal or state, Christmas Day and Good Friday; renders illegal that single women shall hold licenses, unless they at present do so; abolishes duplicate bar-rooms, unless special permission is given by magistrates; requires travellers to go a journey of ten miles from their homes before they become bona fide travellers; and tightens the provisions of the existing law in respect of closing at 11 p.m. If the bill passes the legislative council South Australia will have in operation the most advanced liquor law in the whole Commonwealth.

WILL MAKE EXHIBIT

At the Alaska-Yukon Fair in Seattle.

Montreal, Dec. 30.—It is announced that the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific railways will make a joint exhibit of the resources of the dominion at next year's Alaska-Yukon fair in Seattle. Special attention will be devoted to the natural productions of the regions traversed by both railways. A handsome building 40x50 feet will be erected to hold this railway exhibit, the company having been allotted three thousand square feet of space. As there promises to be an enormous attendance at the fair the opportunity to advertise the resources of Canada is regarded as an exceptionally good one. There will be special exhibits of fruit, fresh and deep water fish, as well as a fine mineral collection.

The dominion government is to have a large exhibit at this exhibition. Mr. Hutchison, the dominion commissioner, will go to Seattle next month to make arrangements. The government plans to erect a building 140 by 200 feet of handsome design, in which the exhibits of the different provinces will be arranged.

NEW LAW COMES IN.

Quebec, Dec. 30.—The insurance act, passed at the last session of the Quebec legislature, comes into effect today. As ultimately adopted, this act is generally satisfactory to all the interests affected through some rather bitter conflicts marked its passage through the legislature and committees. Some of the fire insurance interests of the province claim that the act does not offer sufficient protection to their companies against foreign competitors, and a delegation waited on the provincial treasurer recently to make representations to this effect.

In spite of these objections, however, an order-in-council was passed putting the new law into effect, and the provincial government has announced that some latitude will be allowed to form some idea of its workings before any changes are considered.

Made A Perfect Score.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 30.—Francis Croix, a French-Canadian, who made a remarkable endurance record a few weeks ago, rolled a perfect 300 score, with twelve consecutive strikes, while bowling in a pick-up match on the city alleys, following this feat with another strike at the opening of a second game. This is the second perfect score made in Spokane, the first being rolled by Richard Bierce, two years ago.
