

The Prices That Are Paid

Various Centres. Montreal, Dec. 28.-About 495 head of butchers' cattle, 65 calves, 403 sheep and lambs and 276 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stock yards this forenoon. Good cattle were rather scarce and sold for nearly one-quarter of a cent per lb. higher than similar cattle sold here a week ago. Trade was exceedingly dull and many of the butchers went to the East End Abattoir, where there were larger supplies of good cattle. Prime Beeves sola at 4%c. to 5c. per lb., but they were not extra; pret-ty good animals sold at 3½c. to near 44c., and the common stock at 21c. to 34c. per lb. Calves sold at 4c. to 5c. per lb.
