A LOSS TO KINGSTON

IF THE BONUS FAILS TO CARRY.

Every Leading Citizen Expresses Himself in Favor of the Bonus—The Ratepayers' Duty is to Vote Yes.

The following are more opinions of citizens upon the Wormwith bonus by-law. All seem to be strongly in favor of the bonus, believing that it would be injurious to the city to allow the piano works to move from here.

When David G. Laidlaw was approached in regard to the by-law, he said he was strongly in favor of it, and did not see how any citizen could be against it.

S. Oberdorfer—"Yes, I favor it; it is nothing but right and just. Kent Eros, bankers, favor the by-law and will vote for it.

Ald. L. L. Henderson said: "I am strongly in favor of the by-law for the reason that I believe the Wormwith piano works is one of the best industries in Kingston, and from information I have I think that we would lose it unless we bonus it.

R. J. Carson considered that an industry beneficial to Kingston should certainly be kept here. The Wormwith piano factory had been the source of subsistence for over sixty families of the city.

Cornelius Bermingham expressed himself as decidedly in favor of the by-law. Kingston, he said, could not afford to lose such a valuable industry.

Dr. D. E. Mundell declared himself in favor of the bonus. The company had expended much money in the city and supported many families.

W. E. Bassam—"I will vote and work for the by-law, which I am confident will carry."

John Hewton—"Both hands up for it. I favor getting as many industries as we possibly can and bonusing those that need it.
