THE SOLDIERS WON

OTTAWA CLIFFSIDERS DEFEATED BY 10 TO 5.

The 14th Regiment Team Was Too Much For the Easterners—The Ice Was Soft—The Attendance Was Small.

The first hockey match of the season was pulled off at the covered rink on Monday night, when the Ottawa Cliffside, of the Interprovincial League, were defeated ten goals to five by the 14th Regiment team, defenders of the senior O.H.A. title. The ice was in very poor condition, due to the soft weather, and in places was covered with water to a depth of one-half an inch or more. The crowd was very small, considering the standing of the two teams. The game was quite late in starting, it being 8:45 o'clock before the referee blew his whistle to call the men together.

The soldiers had the better of the argument from whistle to whistle, and if the Cliffside are the best amateur team in Canada, with the exception of the Victorias, the soldiers have it over anything in the Dominion, like a freer fight. The Cliffside have been at work steadily for some weeks, while the 14th have not had one full practice and were minus a player. The locals were not a great deal faster on the forward line than Ottawa, but they are better stick handlers, quicker and trickier, and their shots are better. In comparing the two defences, the soldiers have one superior to the Ottawa septette. The teams faced each other as follows:

This seemed to put the necessary ginger into the locals and they opened up, Dobson and Crawford combining forces for the rush. About one minute after Dion landed another point, on an individual rush, and a nice clean shot. This did put the soldiers on their mettle and from then till the end of the half they had the met with the hard name on the run, scoring four goals, while their opponents were not allowed any.
Both aggregations came back strong in the second half and again set a fierce old pace. The visitors started in to set the run, and when they were ready to split, the soldiers were just starting, and the Cliffside tried hard to keep up. For the first fifteen minutes of the second half good clean hockey was played, neither team securing a goal. The first went to Bernier on the Cliff, landed one, then the soldiers landed one, until the score stood 10 to 5 for the locals.
The 14th team showed great form last evening when one thinks of its lack of practice. "Semtor" Powell sprang a pleasant surprise on his friends last evening when he appeared in uniform. "Jack" stated that he had retired, but the fall of the single was too great and he yielded to the strains. Here's hoping he plays all season.
Van Horn played a star game and with Powell forms a line it is hard to get through. For a new man that is a man playing his first game in the sport company, Semtor takes all the cakes on the line. He played a star game, a game that places his second only to Hiseock as a goal keeper in this city, and that is a place that any player can be proud to hold. "Teddy" saved the soldiers time and again, and always had his head right with him.
George Richardson, Bernier and Crawford are playing fine hockey and are a strong line. Dobson put up one of the best games of his career. Crawford is playing better hockey this year than he did last. He is playing faster, checking closer, and shooting better than ever before.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.
ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made in any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
DUTIES.—Six months' residence upon the land in each of the first three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may purchase a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years, from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate 40 acres extra.
A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take up another homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered Sections South of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton meridians, and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
LANDS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.
COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not less than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.
GEM.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$3.00. At least one acre must be expended on the claim each year, or sold to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.
PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.
PRELIMINARY.—Ten leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 24 per cent after the output exceeds \$100.
