## CRUMLEY BROS.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or individuals over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section (160 acres), more or less, of available Crown land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Office or Sub-Agency for application. Entry fee of \$100 generally made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, and continuing homestead.

BUTTES.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within the boundaries of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along-side his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate 100 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$30 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered Sections south of Highway 43, East of the Calgaray and Edmonton lines, and west of the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of the six years from date of purchase and a house worth \$300.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rent of \$100 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having a claim may locate a claim 1,000 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or until the Mining Recorder. When \$600 has been expended on paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

MINES.—Mines may be generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00. DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 per mile per annum. Royalty, 25 per cent after the output exceeds 10,000.

## IT IS DECIDEDLY RICH

TRINITY CORPORATION  
OWNS OVER \$14,097,330.

Maintains Ten Churches and Sixteen Schools and Loans Money Without Interest.

New York, Jan. 6.—Trinity corporation for the first time has issued a financial statement in detail. Its assets total \$14,079,338.40, which includes productive real estate valued at \$13,646,300.

The corporation maintains ten churches and sixteen schools. Its total income for the year was approximately \$780,000 over \$750,000 of which was derived from the corporation's real estate holdings and only about \$818,000 from rents. The expenditures for the year amounted to over \$791,000, leaving an actual deficit of \$11,965. For the twelve months Trinity has a debt of \$500,000 incurred in the erection of modern business buildings and apartment houses.

The collections and contributions for the year amounted to about \$94,500 and following a custom that began after the foundation of the church in 1697, all of this amount was given for charitable and missionary objects, in addition to the sum directly appropriated for these purposes.

The corporation's outstanding loans to churches outside of its own parish amounted to \$370,946, and as it collects no interest on the loans Trinity in effect makes an annual contribution to the work of these churches in amount of the interest which it receives from collecting.

Trinity's income of \$780,000 is expended mainly through the three channels of its religious activities, its schools and the requirements of its property. The expenditures for its ten churches and chapels amounted to \$277,111 and for its schools \$63,756.

Its estate expenditures amounted to \$44,180, the largest item being its taxes. Repairs was the item of next importance, the figures for repairs, alterations and supplies to buildings other than churches and schools being \$103,973.

KINGSTON Urged To Arouse.

St. Catharines, Dec. 14.—The dominion government says that it has decided that Old Niagara shall be the permanent abiding place of the annual militia camp, and seems to have set about to improve and preserve in every way possible the historic property. Following the acquirement of more land for the camp, and the construction of new rifle ranges, comes the report that the historic old fort Mississauga, is to be repaired and put into better shape.

The militia department, it is understood, will take immediate steps to prevent the further ruin of the old fort. The plans are not yet completed, but they will include two concrete breakwaters to protect the ramparts from the action of the waves of Lake Ontario. These breakwaters will be about twelve feet wide and will extend diagonally out into the lake for about 150 feet, one running southerly from the east bastion of the fort and the other northerly from the north bastion. The idea of forming this huge V with the fort in the apex is so as to allow the action of the waves to pile up, in the enclosure a wide sandy beach.

The ramparts will also be repaired, and the canon which used to look out from the eastern bastion is likely to be replaced. New doors will be put up, and the approaches to the fort improved.

Port George will also be repaired.

This news will be received with great satisfaction by thousands of Canadians who have been grieved to witness the havoc which storms of recent years have done on the embankments of this one of Canada's most historic forts.
