Centres. Montreal, Jan. 4.—About 1,300 head of butchers' cattle, 77 calves, 497 sheep and lambs and 1,482 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St Charles stockyards this forenoon. The arrivals of live stock for the week at this market consisted of 2,177 cattle, 138 calves, 898 sheep and lambs and 2,558 fat hogs. The soft weather had a depressing effect on the market, and the prices of cattle had a downward tendency, excepting for prime animals which were not plentiful. Prime beeves sold at 41c. to 51c. per lb.; pretty good cattle, 34c. to near 44c., and the common stock, 24c. to 34c. per lb. Calves sold at from 4c. to 51c. per lb. Sheep sold at about 4c. and lambs at 5%c. per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold at 64c. to 7c. per lb.
