ROSE IS IN PRISON

HE WAS BROUGHT FROM TORONTO TO-DAY.

He Seemed to Be in Fine Condition—Hurried to the Penitentiary—Now in the New Comers' Cell.

Smiling, and giving every evidence of being unconcerned as regards his fate, Alexander Rose, the daring criminal and jail breaker, sentenced at Toronto, by Judge Winchester, to life imprisonment, arrived in the city at 1:30 o'clock, and was immediately taken to the big prison at Portmouth. The prisoner was shackled, and there were two constables in charge of him.

The train from the west was twenty minutes late, but there was a cab awaiting the constables at the outer junction, and inside of two minutes after the train had pulled in Rose was on his way to the penitentiary.

Rose was a model prisoner on the way down, so the constables say. He gave them no trouble whatever, and put in most of his time reading and smoking, and at intervals talked to the two constables, asking questions about the penitentiary and wondering what he would be set about to do when he arrived there.

The prisoner is twenty-four years of age, but many who happened to get a glimpse of him at the outer station believed that he looked even younger than that. He was dressed in a blue suit, with peak cap, and black overcoat.

"It's kind of chilly, isn't it?" the prisoner remarked, as he jumped into the cab.

Rose had some other penitentiary friends for company, on the way down, a constable from Hamilton being on the same train with two prisoners from that city, sentenced to terms in the penitentiary for assault and robbery.

The constables with these two prisoners also took a cab at the outer junction and followed the cab in which Rose was being conveyed.

There was only a small crowd at the station when the train arrived, and very few people apparently knew that the prisoner was to be brought from Toronto to-day. However, the fact became known as soon as the constables stepped on to the platform and the noise of the shackles attracted much attention, and soon many eyes were turned on the prisoner.

However, the curious ones had very little time to satisfy themselves, as there was no delay whatever, there being no stop even for refreshments. The prisoner was given all he wanted to eat on the train.

The prisoner broke down entirely after sentence was passed upon him, in Toronto, since then he has been braced up, and apparently has an idea that in the course of a few years he may be able to secure his freedom.

The prisoner is a son of a former chief of police, at Brockville and the father and two brothers were in court when the life sentence was passed upon him.

The crimes for which Rose is paying the penalty were assaults on May 1st in Toronto, on Ethel Skitch, in Webbwood's store, and on Allan G. Duncan, in a store on Adelaide street. The third charge, that of breaking jail, was not pressed.

It will be remembered that Rose was one of seven prisoners, who made a sensational escape from the Toronto jail, in July last. He was recently captured in Virginia.

There is a striking resemblance between Rose and Slack, and this was remarked by not a few of the prison authorities. It will be remembered that Slack was convicted of an assault upon a Toronto woman and sent to the penitentiary. He declared his innocence and there are those who think Rose was the assailant rather than Slack, and that the resemblance may have caused the mistake.

After a drive through the cold, crisp air the towers of the penitentiary soon loomed in view and Rose and his comrades swept through the big gate. The iron shutters grated together again and Rose, unless pardoned or paroled at some later date, saw the big world practically closed forever against him. Alighting at the front door, Rose soon stood in the warden's office on the right of the entrance. The sheriff handed in his papers, took a receipt for them, and then Rose was accompanied by the prison authorities to the chief keeper's department, where he was given his necessary ablutions, his hair clipped and a change of clothing given.

The clothes he came in from Toronto as also other belongings were noted and the package labelled and put aside, possibly never to be called for use again. In his new garb he was assigned to the newcomers' cell. There he will meditate until to-morrow, when he will be examined by the doctor and if found free from all infectious diseases and able to work, he will be taken before Warden Platt, who will instruct him in the rules and assign him to his monotonous life work. Rose took to his new surroundings in a quiet, dutiful manner. His number is E 766.

A brother of the prisoner came down from Toronto with him, and the scene at the prison gate, where the parting between the two took place was a most touching one.

On Leaving Toronto.
Toronto, Jan. 7.—Alexander Rose, the thing and jail breaker, sentenced on Tuesday, to imprisonment for life, left for Kingston penitentiary, this morning, in charge of a county constable. His leg was ironed as well as hands cuffed. Rose's father and two brothers said good-bye to him in the coach and they supplied him with fruits and confectionery.

A female inmate of Rockwood asylum was, to-day, sent to her home, in the West Indies, in charge of one of the provincial matrons. Immigration Officer Doolin escorted her as far as the outer junction.

DEFENDS LIMESTONE

GOOD ENOUGH FOR RESIDENTIAL STREETS.

View of City Engineer Craig—As to Paving, He Says He Will Recommend As He Did Three Months Ago.

City Engineer Craig says that when he reports again to the Board of Works as to permanent roads for the business section he will recommend that he did several months ago—viz., that the council pass a by-law for an amount that will cover the cost of the best pavement, and that after various tenders be called for several kinds of paving so as to get the lowest possible price. He claims that if a pavement was chosen at the outset the city would not get the work done as cheaply, for the firms supplying the kind of pavement chosen would have every opportunity to form a combination and run up the price. That has been done before, he says, and the course he has adopted he claims to be the best. After the by-law is passed (if that happens, and he has every hope it will this year) he says the council can decide upon the kind of pavement when the tender figures are before it. That is the stand he takes on the paving question.

When asked if he thought the limestone used for macadam roads in Kingston was good enough he re-

plied that he was satisfied it was, considering the small cost. For instance, it cost seventy-two cents a yard to place limestone on the streets. To put granite there it would cost somewhere around two dollars a yard, and in the residential streets the limestone was plenty good enough, for supposing the granite lasted ten years and the limestone five years, the cost would be much in favor of the limestone. He couldn't see that Kingston could do any better than continue to construct limestone macadam roads in the residential sections. Outside engineers were agreed as to this, Mr. Craig said, and he referred to a recent letter he had from A. W. Campbell, commissioner of highways for Ontario, who endorsed his recommendation to the city council.

City Engineer Craig further stated that he would never recommend limestone macadam for the business section. Although the money by-law, which was defeated on Monday, had been amended by the city council, without his sanction, an \$7,500 bid to what he had recommended, Engineer Craig said he would never consent to construct limestone macadam roads in the business section.

The engineer was reminded that this action of the city council in increasing the original amount of the by-law for the benefit of the business section had something to do with its defeat, and he said:

"I recommended the passage of a by-law for \$12,500 for limestone macadam roads in the residential sections, and had the streets specified. None of the money would have been expended in limestone on the business blocks. It would have been wiser not to have changed my figures in the by-law, for \$12,500 was sufficient for this year. Still, I am very sorry the by-law was defeated for it only means a year's delay in rebuilding the city roads."
