A MORAL PEST. Was So Characterized By An Irish Judge.

New York, Jan. 11.—A cable despatch to the San from London says: Commenting upon the disclosures as to the gambling among girls at the Quarter Sessions, at Nans, Ireland, in the course of a slander case against a woman bookmaker, Judge Barry said that the vice of gambling had gone so far in many towns that women bookmakers did a large business with domestic servants, who thus frittered away their wages. He blamed bridge whist for fostering the love of gambling in the upper classes, characterizing it as a "moral pest." It was well known that the ready-money bookmaker did a large business among the factory girls of London and all the large cities, going to meet them as they left their work on pay days. Women in the factory often act as their agents.

Ex-Jailer Jailed.

Vancouver, Jan. 11.—J. Miller, for five years jailer at the city police station, was discharged a few months ago. Since then he has been proprietor of the Turkish baths which the police raided. Friday, as disorderly resort. He was tried and sentenced to six months in jail. The magistrate lectured him severely and Miller, before being led out of the dock, over which he had long presided, broke down and wept like a child.

Skated Backwards Into Hole.

Brookville, Ont., Jan. 11.—Lewis Davis, one of the swiftest forwards of the City Hockey League, almost lost his life in the St. Lawrence river by skating backwards into the swift water below the town, where it never freezes. A companion heard his cries and went to his assistance. By crawling carefully on his hands and knees, he succeeded in reaching Davis, and pulled him out. It was several hours before Davis was out of danger.

Charles F. Labadie was killed by a train on the Grand Trunk at Walkerville.

Malcolm Leitch, bailiff of Dutton, was killed by a M.C.R. train at West Lorne.

Walter Thorogood, of Toronto, aged twenty-five, was arrested on a charge of bigamy.

S.S. Tumbian has reached Liverpool; S.S. Sicilian and Grampan are at Halifax.

Edward M. Meahan, one of the best-known Toronto newspaper printers, died after a short illness.

Walter Hlythe was committed for trial, at East Toronto, on the charge of murdering his wife near Agincourt.

At Virdee, Man., Harvey Simpson, conservative, defeated Robert Fookie, liberal, in a by-election by 206 majority.

C. de Forbes was sentenced at Winnipeg to twenty-three months in jail for forgery and misappropriation of funds.

At Paris, a mail sack containing bonds, etc., worth \$200,000, was stolen from a delivery wagon in broad daylight.

W. R. Stock, Waterdown, who is well-known as a farmer at East Flamborough, Wentworth county, was appointed farmer at Mimico asylum.

It is understood that Lieut.-Gov. Forget, of Saskatchewan, whose term of office will shortly expire, will be appointed to the senate in succession to the late Senator Bernier.

There is no truth in the report that Messrs. James Osborne and C. Murphy, superintendents respectively at Toronto and Montreal, are to be transferred to each other's posts.

Salem Assaleh, the Syrian peddler, who shot and killed his brother, and tried to murder his sister-in-law, at Hawkesbury, on December 28th, had both his legs amputated at L'Orignal.

Fifteen men have been dismissed, and seventy-two men, all told, have been disciplined during the past month in Superintendent James Osborne's division, which extends from Havelock to Detroit.

J. W. Levesque, M.P.P., for Laval, is one of the numerous defendants in libel actions instituted by George E. Foster, M.P., arising out of speeches made during the federal election campaign of last fall.

At Regina, a deputation of ladies waited on the government with regard to protection in the form of dower rights. It is stated the ladies have every reason to be gratified with the result of their mission.

Five early-to-day in the Hayden Dry Goods company at Texarkana, Ark., and the E. L. Chatfield Hardware company's establishment, and Cassidy's saloon in East Broad street, caused \$200,000 damage.

Chief Justice Falconbridge this morning gave a decision awarding \$2,000 damages to Mrs. Thompson, now residing at Sudbury, for the fatal accident to her husband at the Trethewey mine, Cobalt, some time ago.

Mayor McLaren, Hamilton, Ont., elected on the independent ticket in his inaugural address, declared himself in favor of a board of control, the appointment of a strong industrial committee and a commission.

At Taber, Alta., fire completely destroyed the building and stock of the Taber company's store. The stone block, in which were the post office and Eastern Township Bank, was also destroyed, but the mails and post office safe were saved.

Chief Justice Falconbridge gave judgment for \$700 damages in favor of Mrs. Blanche Augusta Brown, Windsor, the seventeen-year-old widow of J. B. Brown, Bell Telephone company lineman, accidentally killed June 11th.

Gideon Hodgkins, Cambridge township, Lincoln county, has issued a writ against the hydro-electric power commission of Ontario to set aside an agreement for the use of certain portions of his land for the creation of the power line towers.

A committee, representing the Moral Social and Reform Association of Ontario, waited on Sir James Whitney and urged increased vigilance in the enforcement of the law in the province in regard to gambling, liquor licenses, and houses of prostitution.

FIGHT WITH BURGLAR. Officer Catches a Man in a Grocery Store.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Jan. 11.—At one o'clock, yesterday morning, Officer Farrell, of the police force, found the back door of a grocery store, belonging to A. E. Dell, open. Entering the store the policeman was gripped by a burglar, and only after a prolonged struggle did the officer down his man and convey him to the lock-up.

The man gave his name as J. J. Hopkins, living on Grey street. He is twenty-five years old and married. Investigation showed that the man had gained an entry to the store by breaking the back window and forcing the catch. He had unlocked the back door to make a hurried departure in case his operations were disturbed, and it was this which caused his discovery.

A Woman Judge.

New York, Jan. 11.—A cable despatch to the World from Paris says: France has her first woman judge, Mme. Jousselin took the oath of office on Wednesday. She is a judge in the "Council des Prudhommes," a tribunal which decides certain disputes in trade. Selected by an association of men representing the cloth industry, Mme. Jousselin was appointed a few days ago.

Rothschild's Munificence.

Paris, Jan. 11.—Baron Edmond de Rothschild has donated \$10,000 for distribution among the poor of Paris, to-morrow, the date of the marriage of his son, Baron Maurice de Rothschild, to Miss Noemie Halphen, daughter of Jules Halphen.

Charged With Horse-stealing.

Canby, Ont., Jan. 11.—Walter Fanning, a young man from Danforth, was committed to jail on a charge of stealing a horse from William Hooper, of Percy township.

Bethune, France, Jan. 11.—Amid cries of "death to the bandits" Abel and Auguste Polet, Canut Promant and Theophile Deroze, convicted of eighteen murders, 118 robberies and suspected of innumerable other crimes were guillotined, this morning, near the prison wall.

DID NOT ANSWER. Fully the Description of Man Wanted.

Whitby, Ont., Jan. 11.—The man arrested, last night, at Cedar Grove, on suspicion of being Rev. J. H. Carmichael, wanted at Adrian, Mich., for the murder of Gideon Browning, in the Rattle Run Methodist church, there on Tuesday night last, was found, this morning, not fully to answer the description of Mr. Carmichael and accordingly was set at liberty. It is reported, however, that he may be re-arrested.

Drenched Body With Oil.

Detroit, Jan. 11.—Late developments have failed to throw much light on the Battle Run church murder mystery. The motive for the killing of Browning is still lacking. Rev. J. H. Carmichael, the missing pastor, was reported to have been seen in Indiana, in Chicago and in Wisconsin, but verified reports of the preacher's whereabouts are still lacking.

M. C. R. To Be Electrified.

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 11.—The Journal says that important changes in the operation of the Michigan Central railway have been decided upon, involving the electrification of all the road's terminals here, and of the main line as far west as Ypsilanti, which is thirty miles from Detroit. Electric power will be generated by waterpower of the Huron river, at Chelsea, Mich.

Confesses To Murder.

Syracuse, N.Y., Jan. 11.—A despatch to the Herald from Onondaga, N.Y., says: George Burlingame, charged with the murder of Elbert W. Baldwin, whose body was found in the canal at Onondaga a month ago, has confessed that he stabbed Baldwin in a quarrel over a woman, then struck him over the head with a heavy stone and threw the body into the canal.

Reduction At Ottawa.

Ottawa, Jan. 11.—A movement is on foot to have the number of tavern licenses in Ottawa reduced from sixty-five to fifty.

FREE FIGHT IN COURT. A Sensational Affair at St. Agathe, Que.

Montreal, Jan. 11.—A sensational affair is reported from St. Agathe, a small town in the northern part of the county of Terrebonne. The trial of one Robert, for assault, was in progress before District Magistrate Grignon, when Jailer Loiseau entered and spoke very harshly to several of the witnesses and when ensured by the judge he insulted the magistrate in open court.

The judge shortly afterwards condemned the jailer for contempt of court and ordered a bailiff, Victor Gagneau, to take charge of the delinquent.

Here another scuffle took place and as no arrest was possible, the case ended by the magistrate declaring that he would not sit unless the jailer, who is also guardian of the municipal hall, was dismissed.
