Up to this time it had not been generally known in Pittsburg that Moore had been divorced by his wife, but an investigation of court records shows that on last November 10th Mrs. Moore obtained an absolute divorce from Moore on the grounds of cruel and barbarous treatment.

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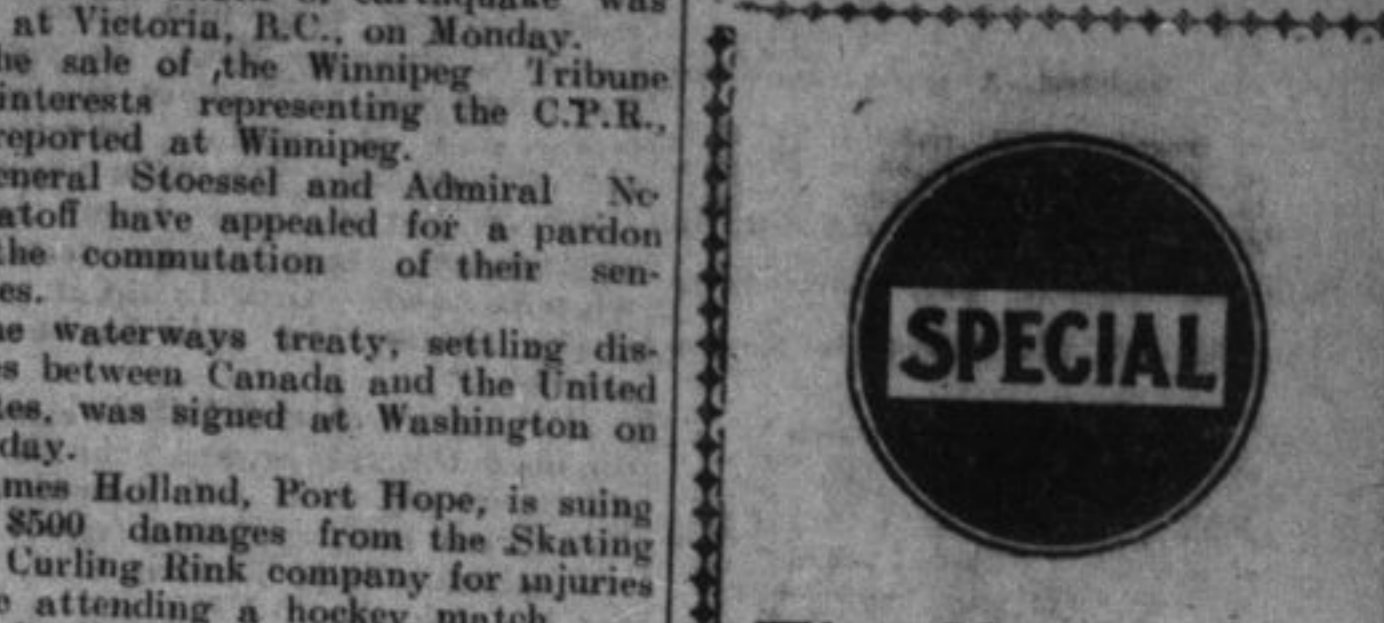
