When she grew up, however, she developed big ideas, and, according to her brotherin-law, a working jeweler named Coulson, who married her sister, Lillian, i was Violet's influence that brought about a separation between himself and wife. Public attention was first directed to the case by the reports that a gir of twenty-five, named Violet Charlesworth, who was driving a motor car along a road in North Wales, near Conway, last Saturday night, had been thrown over the glass screen in front of the car on to the seashore beneath. A man chauffeur and her sister, Lillian, were in the car at the time, and to the police superintendent who appeared on the scene soon after the accident they made the statement

that Violet had gone over the chiff. The superintendent later said that he did not press them for details, as both were greatly upset. The search for the body was without avail, although it could not possibly have been carried away by the sea, the water at this point being very shallow. There were no marks on the rocks, no trace of blood; only a tam o'shanter cap an an empty notebook being found.

Creditors All Over England. The reporters who next day sought to give full details of the accident could obtain no news from the chaut ieur or Lillian Coulson, who was sta villa Mrs. Coulson had occupied with her sister, Violet, at St. Asaph. Th motor car showed no signs of the col lision which was said to have caused Violet's precipitation over the cliff and little by little other details came out which indicated that Violet harlesworth had planned this mo thod of disappearance in order to escape her creditors, who were begin ning to grow impatient for the money she had promised to pay when she came into her fortune this month These creditors are said to be all over

Violet was fond of motoring and in dulged in it to the fullest extent. She appears to have had no difficulty in btaming a new car whenever sh wanted one, and recently purchased one from a well-known firm for £1. 200, paying part in money down. Several London jewelers have done usiness with or "been done" by her, one firm alone having supplied with trinkets to the value of £1,000 She rented an estate in Wiltshire and hired a mansion in Scotland, where she was a noticeable visitor at the Highland meeting last summer. Sh staved at various times at some o the best London botels, and in some cases paid heavy bills.

Violet was a quiet, demure little person. She gave all with whom sh had dealings the impression that s was entirely guiltless. Not a word is breathed against her character, but she seems to have exercised an unacountable fascination upon all th she met. Perhaps the strangest frature of her case is her Stock Ex change transactions.

Lost Heavily In Money Panic. A member of a London stock broker's firm with whom Miss Charlesworth dealt said : "She owes us £10. 000 for speculation, mostly in American rails. Four years ago she first? wrote to us, with an introduction which was in overy way sound, that she wished to speculate on a small scale. All our business at first was by letter and telegram. At the outset she dealt in small operations, and was successful, her sums amounting to a good deal. Her speculations grew larger, and then her luck turned. At one time she held 1,550 shares Union Pacific. Then the American money panic came and she was hit very hard indeed. A bear speculation also failed. She was keenly businesslike, possessing a knowledge of the Stock Exchange that many men might

Land Regulations. ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or

father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. DtTIES.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quartersection along-side his homestead. Price
\$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six
months in each of six years from date
of homestead entry (including the time
required to earn homestead patent) and
cultivate fift—acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his
becomestead right and cannot obtain a homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$8.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered Sections South of township 45, East of the Cal-gary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in

each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300. IVNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST MINING REGULATIONS. COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre. PIACER MINING CLAIMS generally 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 24 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.
