## MAKES CURDS GASSY AND CHEESE ILL FLAVORED

Corroborates Views of Prof. Dean, Whose Statements Had Not Been Accepted-The Aerating of Milk Discussed.

New light was thrown upon an old ubject when G. H. Barr gave to the Lastern Ontario Dairymen's Association the results of experiments conducted by him jast summer to ascer tain if benefit or injury is done to milk by airing it. According to Mr. Barr's statements, which were not dis puted by any of the members, present, the exposure of fresh milk to the air by dipping is open to serious obection, and is responsible for much of the gassy curds and flavors that troude the cheesemaker. A few years ago Prof. Dean reported on experiments that pointed to the same conclusion Dairymen at that time considered such tatements to be rank heresy, and said that the professor's college experiments were scarcely applicable to factory as been growing that acration is o

Mr. Barr selected two farms in the vicinity of Smith's Falls, and during July and August made careful tests of the milk as it came to the factory. He also visited the farms daily reat the milk by different methods, by cooling alone, by cooling and acraing and acrating alone. Invariably exposed by acrating were gassy, while those from milk that had been cooled out but not stirred or dipped yielded. good cheese.
