LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Montreal, Jan. 11.—About 1,124 head of butchers' cattle, 42 calves, 544 sheep and lambs and 1,477 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. The arrivals of live stock here during the week consisted of 2,365 cattle, 135 calves, 1,114 sheep and lambs, and 3,589 fat hogs. Trade was fair, with slightly higher prices paid for good cattle. Prime beefs sold at 44c to 51c per lb.; a good good animal, 32c to 41c, and the common stock 24c to 31c per lb. Calves sold at from 31c to 51c per lb. Sheep sold at about 4c per lb., and the lambs at about 5c. Do. Good lots of fat hogs sold at from 6c to 7c per lb.

Chicago, Jan. 11.—Receipts at the stockyards to-day were the largest on record, the estimated arrivals being 42,000 cattle, 80,000 hogs and 26,000 sheep, comprising 3,279 cars. The high price of corn was given as the reason for the big movement. Cattle—The market was weak, with prices off 15c to 25c; steers, \$4.60 to \$7.40; cows, \$3 to \$5.50; heifers, \$3 to \$5.75; bulls, \$3.25 to \$3.30; calves, \$3.50 to \$10; stockers and feeders, \$2.50 to \$5.10. Hogs—The market was weak, but prices 10c to 20c lower; choice heavy shipping, \$6 to \$6.15; butchers', \$6 to \$6.10; light, mixed, \$5.50 to \$5.75; choice light, \$5.75 to \$6; packing, \$5.70 to \$6; pigs, \$4.50 to \$5.75; roughs, \$5.25 to \$5.60; stags, \$4 to \$4.75; dairies, \$5.75 to \$6.10. Sheep and lambs—Receipts 28,000 head, active, sheep steady; lambs 25c to 30c lower; lambs, \$5 to \$7.70; a few \$7.75; yearlings, \$6.50 to \$7; wethers, \$5.25 to \$5.75; ewes, \$5 to \$5.25; sheep, mixed, \$2.50 to \$3.25.
