"Larry" Schady, ex-manager of the Toronto ball team, had a foot badly frozen at his home in Ohio.

All Smith, of Ottawa, says that Pittsburg has been able to develop only one native hockey player of class. Ottawa Free Press: "Marty" Walsh, Ottawa's chunky centre, promises to keep pace with his scoring record of last year.

In every case arising out of betting on the New York tracks last season the courts have held that what was done by the alleged violators of the law was perfectly legal.

The Manitoba and North-West Amateur Hockey Association is on the verge of dissolution. The Brandon Shamrocks threaten to withdraw if the clause that controls the association insists on recognizing Charlton, of Portage, as an amateur.

Canada's first grand circuit meeting will take place next summer at Fort Erie track, which gets Buffalo's dates, August 16th to 20th, the move from Kenilworth park being presumably so as not to clash with the law in New York State against pool selling and book-making.

Charles Taylor, the oldest trainer and driver of trotting horses in America, who died at his home in White River Junction, Vt., on Saturday, 102 years old, was born in West Williams, in Middlesex, county, Ont. During his lifetime he had seen the trotting lowered from 2:58 1/2 to 2:04. Taylor campaigned many fast horses, one of which was the grey trotter, Factory Boy, that gained a record of 2:20, about twenty years ago. He was active in the sulky until he was more than 100 years old, and drove his favorite pacer, Robert B. 2:12, in races in 1904.

Longboat is now under control of "Jimmy" De Forrest, New York, trainer, and he states that the Indian's feet are in first-class condition and will be all right when the race comes off. Longboat is now training in the open air, and doing road work. He will continue outdoor work unless the weather forces him inside.

Mr. De Forrest says that Longboat will win the race from Shrub. "He can run as fast as the Englishman for the ten or fifteen miles and still be there for the finish. Shrub cannot go the Marathon distance, and will kill himself off before he has gone fifteen miles if he attempts to set a hot pace. De Forrest says that Longboat will win under the Maple Leaf colors."

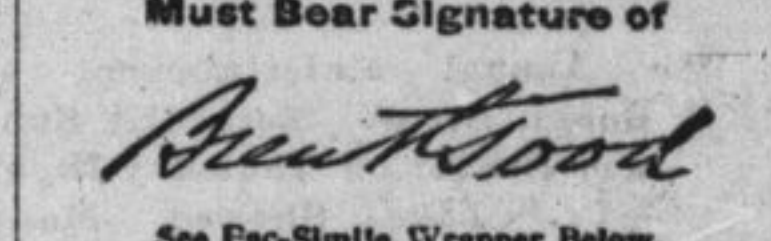
