### TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

The Kingston Legislators' Began Their Duties.

The council-elect met on Monday, January 11th; Anthony McGuin Ranck, reeve; John Purdy, deputy reeve; Elgin Henry Stover, William Reid, Benson Coulter, councillors, qualified.

Communications from S. S. Corbett and W. J. Blacklock were referred to the local board of health, and to the trustees of the interested school sections respectively. The clerk and treasurer were appointed to draft a proper form of application for use of persons seeking compensation for sheep killed by dogs. The reeve and treasurer to be a committee to get legal advice regarding the Smith and Harpell case. The nomination of Dr. Edwards as medical health officer for the township was accepted. Messrs. Reid and Coulter moved that J. F. Gibson, M.D., be appointed medical health officer, which was carried. W. J. Smythe appointed for two years, and William Blacklock for three years, as members of the board of health. Moved, by Messrs. Stover and Coulter, that E. K. Purdy be appointed assessor for \$70, which was carried. Messrs. Reid and Stover moved that to facilitate and to secure a better supervision of the public roads, the township be divided into four sections. To Councillor Reid, all roads east of the Perth road and extending to the Rideau canal. To Councillor Stover all roads west of the Perth road and extending west to Glenvale, to Councillor Coulter, all roads west of Glenvale, and extending to West Brook and north of and including Florida; to Deputy Reeve Purdy, all roads south of the York road; and that the reeve act only (with regard to roads) upon request of a councillor or the deputy reeve—carried. Voted \$17 to Dr. Edwards, for visits to small-pox case and fumigating home; \$6.50 to George W. Smith, wood for town hall; \$37.50 to warden of penitentiary for stone; \$3 to Benj. Kish and \$4 to Frederick Riley, bonded by all druggists and stores.

Roach, stone, \$30; James Miller, plank, work and drawings, \$2.90; tressurer, balance salary 1908, \$10; clerk, balance salary 1908, \$15; election expenses, \$44.50; S. Armstrong, overpaid, Acton ditch, \$5.90. The clerk ordered to procure copy of Municipal World. On motion, Mr. McCay, given contract to clean streets at \$3 per cord. L. Woods, L. V. Fowler, appointed auditors. By-law passed confirming appointment of assessor and auditors. Adjourned until Monday, February 1st.

Claw for office of assessor. Moved, Walker-Wager, that Thomas Neely be appointed, salary \$40, no extra—Carried. Resolved, Walker-Dwyer, that the reeve sell the timber on line between concession 2 and 3, opposite lot 3. Moved, Wagstaff, that W. D. Black, C. Sills be auditors for 1908, salary \$5 each—Carried. Moved, Claw-Wager, that W. D. Black be appointed delegate to go to Toronto to look after grants on roads, and he receive the sum of twenty dollars for expenses—Carried. Moved, Claw-Wager, that the petition of the Ontario Municipal Association be signed and forwarded to W. J. Paul, M.P.P.—Carried. Moved, Claw-Wager, that the collector's time be extended until February 1st, and be settled with the treasurer on or before that date. Moved, Claw-Wager, that William Goodfellow be appointed a member of the board of health for three years—Carried. Council adjourned to meet at Parham on Saturday, February 27th.

#### Notes From Flower.


