EVENTS TO BE PARTICIPATED IN THIS MONTH.

Several Parties Arranged at Which There Will Be Shooting—Four Courts to Be Held This Season.

Dondon, Jan. 16.—Canadians are always interested in the doings of royalty so that it will not be amiss to tell what the king and queen are doing this month.

Today they left Sandringham for Crichele, where they will be the guests of Lord and Lady Alington. Princess Victoria is to accompany their majesties into Dorset. Two days of the visit will be occupied with shooting. It is expected that their majesties will pay visits to Lord and Lady Shaftesbury, at Wimborne St. Giles, Lord and Lady Bertie at Broomer Park, Lord James of Hereford at Broomer House, and Lord and Lady Wimborne at Canford Manor, during their stay at Crichele.

The king and queen arrived at Windsor on Saturday last, and that place will be the headquarters of the court until Monday, 29th, when their majesties are coming up to Buckingham Palace.

There is to be a memorial service in the Frogmore Mausoleum on the morning of January 22nd, which will be attended by the king and queen, the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the other members of the royal family who are then in England. The Archbishop of Canterbury is to officiate, assisted by the Dean of Windsor, who will by that time have returned home from Biarritz. The king and queen are to go to Buckingham Palace from Windsor on Monday, January 25th, and they will stay in town until they start for their state visit to Berlin, on February 1st or 2th.

The lord-chamberlain has made public the regulations for the four courts to be held during the coming season. Two will take place in late February, or early in March, before the king goes to Biarritz, and the others in May. The rules do not differ in detail from those that have held good since the second year of the present reign, and emphasis is again laid on the fact that no one is expected to attend court more than once in three years, "unless under exceptional circumstances." In the latter year of Queen Victoria's reign the idea got about that "attendance" was expected annually, or, at all events, every alternate season, and, as a consequence, the courts were not only congested to a highly uncomfortable degree, but they presented a distinctly dowdy appearance. People wore the same gowns and trains for several years in succession, those who were not compelled to do so from motives of economy deciding that anything was good enough for a crush, in which feathers, and veils, bouquets, and even trains, were torn from the wearers. The spectacle sometimes tried and distressed the queen, but she was always averse to altering unwritten social laws that had become fixed habits.

King Edward and Queen Alexandra made the stipulation, ever before adding their first court, that attendants should be by invitation only, issued through the office of the lord chamberlain. The rules as to presentations were also made much more stringent, and any lady who undertakes a presentation is directly responsible. Ladies may be accompanied to court by their husbands, provided the latter have been presented at a levee, but gentlemen do not pass the presence, although it is necessary for them to wear full court dress.
