

OLD-AGE PENSIONS.

Will Cost Great Britain £7,750,-000 Per Annum.

London, Jan. 22.-The official figgures on the old-ago pensions granted up to December 31st last show that the total number of pensions granted was 596,038, costing £7,450,315 annum. To this must be added £300, 000. Lloyd-George's estimate of cost, administration. Thus the total outlay for the first year will be least £7,750,000 pounds, even if additional pensions are granted.
