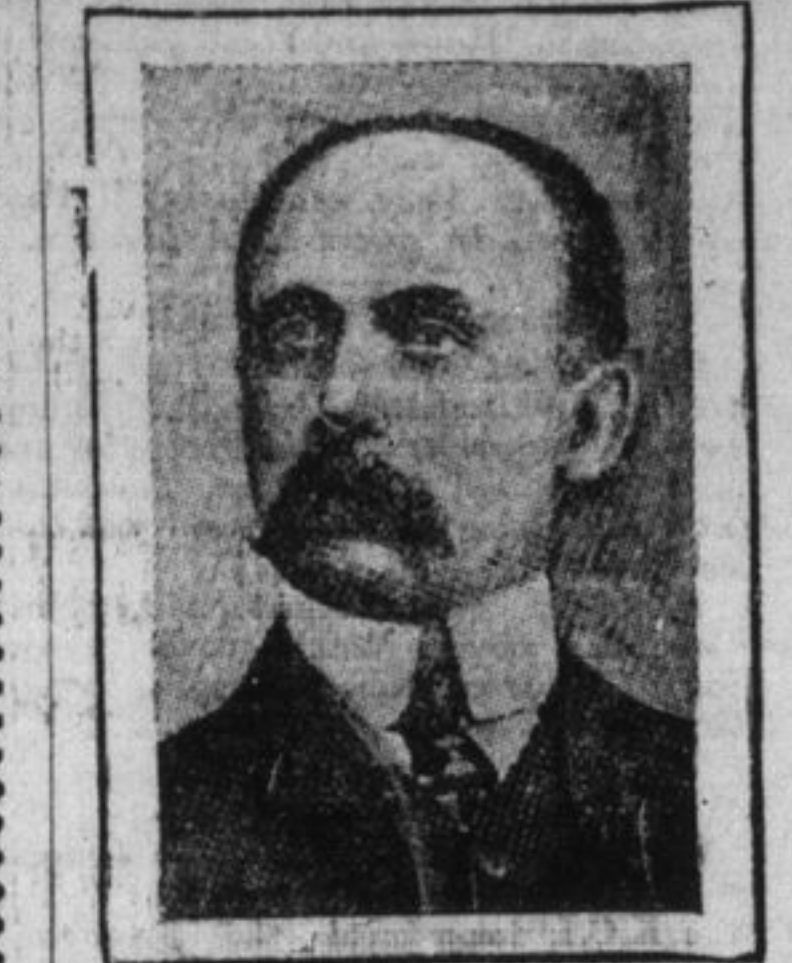

Weeds Abundant—Editor of Dundee Advertiser Remarks That Canada is Going to Be a Sober Nation.

London, Jan. 22.—T. C. Martin, editor of the Dundee Advertiser, and a member of the commission which visited the Dominion in 1908, addressing the Farmers' Club, of Dundee, thought Scotch farmers on the commission brought home from Canada the idea that they had not much to learn from the Canadian farmer. Cultivation was by no means perfect, and there was a good deal of slovenly work allowed. Weeds were abundant. Another impression he formed was that Canada was going to be a sober nation. He did not remember one banquet of the many he attended at which alcoholic liquors appeared. In Toronto the municipal banquet was on the largest scale, but there was nothing to drink but mineral waters and some concoction of ginger.

OLD-AGE PENSIONS.

Will Cost Great Britain £7,750,000 Per Annum.

London, Jan. 22.—The official figures on the old-age pensions granted up to December 31st last show that the total number of pensions granted was 596,038, costing £7,450,315 per annum. To this must be added £300,000, Lloyd-George's estimate of the cost administration. Thus the total outlay for the first year will be at least £7,750,000 per annum, even if no additional pensions are granted. Mr. Asquith's first estimate was £6,000,000.

Pen Picture of The English.

It is hardly to be expected that, having been so long dominant, they possess itself in the best Englishman by an easy and natural attitude of confidence and repose; but in the second and third rate Englishman by an attitude of provincial bumpiness and impudence unequalled in the world. This is what made the Englishman the most unpopular, one may say the most generally disliked, of men. The Germans and the Irish hate him; the French ridicule and distrust him; the average American takes his awkwardness or what Carlyle once called "his pot-bellied quaintness" for patronage, and is forever irritated by him, now that he is too big to be bothered by him as a bully. His power, his stability, his honesty have won him allies, but he has no friends. It would be a sad day for the world if the lion were to die in his claws. The real attitude of other nations toward him would surprise him. It is the mass of men who make the composite photograph's main lineaments for a nation's likeness. And the mass of English people do not make themselves agreeable to other people; often they begin with other themselves upon a studied pugnacious attitude toward all the world.

In London, the male bird has the brilliant plumage. The best of them, as one sees them in Piccadilly, in Bond street, in St. James' street, in the clubs, in the park on a Sunday after church, are fine looking fellows, well set up, and scrupulously well groomed and turned out. But the women? What hats, what clothes, what shoes, what colors, what amorphous figures! One hears of English economies, evidently they begin with the dressmaker's bill. Who permits that nice-looking girl to wear a white flannel skirt, a purple jacket, and a fur hat with a bunch of small feathers sticking out of it at right angles? Here is another with an embroidered linen coat, and a bit of ermine fur, and a straw hat with flowers on it! The grotesque costumes of the women would make one stop to stare were it not that they are so common one ceases at last to notice them.
