

IT WIPED OUT TOWNS

And Hundreds of Persons Were Killed or Injured.

Tanguier, Jan. 22.—A land-slide, following a severe earthquake shock, in the region south of Teguan, has wiped out several small towns. It is reported that hundreds of persons were killed or injured.

Teguan is a walled seaport town of Morocco, thirty-five miles south of Gibraltar. The territory is rich in vineyards and superior fruit abounds. The population is mostly composed of Musselmans, although many Jews live in the country about the town of Teguan.

The late Mrs. Newell, who was Miss Sophronia Grice, daughter of Robert Grice, Gammerque, was forty-five years of age.

\$35,000,000 Lost in Dairying.

Dairymen will find something to interest them in the report of the dairy herd competition, carried out under the direction of the Western Ontario Dairymen's Association.

There were ten herds in this competition. None of the herds contained less than eight head, while there were twenty in one. The average money returned per cow obtained for butter fat or milk supplied dairy factories during six months, from the herds in competition, ran from \$30.70 in the case of the poorest to \$68.50 in case of the best. No less than seven out of the ten gave an average return of well over \$50 per cow in the six months. If the returns for these seven herds could be figured up for the whole year, it is probable it would be found that in not one of the lot was the average return per cow less than \$85, or at least \$25 over and above cost of feed. If all the dairy cows of Ontario could be brought up to that level—and there is no reason why they should not—the total returns from the milkers of the province would be \$35,000,000 a year more than they are now. In other words, \$35,000,000 a year of the possible returns from dairying are now being lost.

JUMPED OUT OR FELL.

A Death Caused By the Terrible Affair.

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 22.—Jacob A. Diebel, one of the best known business men of Windsor, Ont., either fell, or jumped, from the window of a room on the fifty-story of the King Edward hotel, about four o'clock, this morning, and was so badly injured that he died while being taken to the hospital. Mr. Diebel, with his lawyer, A. St. George Ellis, also of Windsor, arrived in the city, yesterday, to prepare for a suit, in which Mr. Diebel was interested and which was to come off, to-day. Mr. Ellis emphatically declared death was due to accident. It is known that serious charges, alleging that Mr. Diebel had been involved in smuggling transactions between Windsor and Detroit, were to have been made public in court, to-day. Mr. Diebel was about fifty years old and unmarried.

ARE IN GOOD HANDS.

King and Queen to Look After Children.

Rome, Jan. 22.—The king and queen will take under their protection Francesco Minsali and his two little sisters, who were buried under the ruins and rescued after eighteen days. Francesco, who is nine years old, will be educated at Leghorn Naval College at the king's expense.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., Jan. 22.—On receipt of orders from the United States navy department, the Skillings, Whitney and Barnes Lumber company, of this city, is loading 250,000 feet of spruce lumber and 110,000 feet of siding for immediate shipment to Italy, for use in building homes for earthquake sufferers.

Glassman promised to offend no more and no charge was lodged. He was escorted to the 319 train, where he purchased a ticket for Toronto.

CANADA'S NET DEBT.

Public Accounts Show Increase of \$14,288,999.

Ottawa, Jan. 22.—The public accounts for the fiscal year ended March 31st last year, were presented to parliament. Receipts on account of consolidated funds were \$96,054,505; expenditures, \$76,641,451. Expenditures charged to capital totalled \$30,429,906; while other expenditures were: For railway subsidies, \$2,637,629; for bounties, \$2,787,254. The net debt was \$277,960,539, an increase of \$14,288,999.

During the year ending March 31st, the government made a profit of \$284,288 upon its silver coinage and \$4,111 upon its copper coinage.

New Telescope A Marvel.

Prof. Robert W. Wood, of the Johns Hopkins University, has perfected an invention based on a discovery—that may revolutionize the costly and cumbersome methods of studying the stars and exploring the universe for new planets, suns, moons, and asteroids. Judging by the success the young scientist has had, the simplicity of the principle of his invention, and the comparatively small cost of models, the possibilities of his telescope are commensurate to the scientific literary visions of H. G. Wells, fictionist extraordinary.

Since the invention of the telescope, in the sixteenth century, it has been the dream of a great part of the scientific world to actually get a glimpse of the life that possible exists on Mars and other planets, to secure some tangible proof of intelligent existence on the worlds around us. But in Prof. Wood's telescope there is no glass! Its reflecting surface—its lens—is mercury, revolving mercury, that magnifies and magnifies as the speed increases until it brings the heavens down startlingly close. He has great hope of its accomplishing astronomical wonders.

Grange And Combine Coal.

Some interesting particulars are given on page seven in regard to a conflict between a grange up in Essex county and the Ontario Coal Dealers' Association.

The members of the grange had arranged with a Detroit dealer for a supply of anthracite at less than ordinary retail prices, and the dealer was coerced into cutting off the supply by the threat of a boycott by the Ontario Coal Dealers' Association.

This is a case that cannot be met by a change in the customs law. This form of coal is a commodity in which, owing to the fact that there is only one source of supply in America, arrangements for the control of prices can be easily arranged. The combination at the point of production cannot be reached by provincial authority, but it is possible to deal with any organization which attempts to control distribution in this province and it is for the attorney-general of Ontario to see that this duty is performed.

Talking Postal Card Coming.

The talking postal card is the invention of a French engineer and has become so popular in that country that the American rights have been secured and the device will be placed in the cities of the United States. The person wishing to send a talking postal card to a friend enters the booth and talks into a machine that records the words on the specially prepared postal card. When the recipient receives the card a hundred or a thousand miles away he or she takes the card to the nearest postal booth and inserts it in a machine which talks the message it receives. The record on the postal card is indestructible, and the exact voice of the sender is heard.

THE NEWS OF WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody

Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Ten white miners and twelve native miners were drowned, on Friday, by the flooding of the Knight mine, at Johannesburg.

Joint stock companies incorporated in Ontario in 1907 and 1908 have an aggregate capitalization of \$600,000,000.

George Eastman, the camera man, has given \$400,000 to the Rochester, N.Y., city hospital. The hospital will build a new main building.

Gompers, Mitchell, and Morrison, the three American labor leaders, have declared that they will ask no pardon in connection with their recent conviction.

Secretary of State Root and Senator Knox, who will be secretary of state in President Taft's cabinet, have been called upon to give evidence in the Panama libel suit.

It is understood that Richeieu and Ontario will show a gross decrease for the year of \$10,000 to \$12,000, but net profits equivalent to about eight per cent. on common stock.

Heeba Streeton, the London novelist, died, on Thursday. He wrote first for Charles Dickens from 1859 until the latter's death, but subsequently wrote religious or philanthropic stories.

Over five hundred loaves of bread were seized in a Jewish bakery at Winnipeg for being short in weight. The proprietor offered a bribe of \$100 to the officials, and will have to answer in court.

The Montreal Southern Counties railway has obtained a franchise from St. Lambert, Que., for an electric line through that town and within a few months it is expected cars will be in operation.

As the result of an incident that occurred at Messina during the earthquake, Prof. Albarnese has challenged to a duel General Mazza, commander of the troops in the area affected by the earthquake.

A big fire has been reported from Gibara, Cuba, which put the town in danger of total destruction. Thirty persons were burned. Abelardo Marquet, a merchant, shot Aurelia Pelman, a customs inspector.

Secretary Wilson announces that the International Waterways Commission will meet, on Jan. 26th, at Toronto. The United States-Canadian boundary line question will be discussed. Both the Canadian and American sections of the commission will be present.

A petition requesting President Roosevelt to give up his intended trip to Africa on the ground that the force of his example will tend to induce the slaughter of wild animals for the sake of sport is being circulated among the school children of the state by the New Hampshire Women's Humane Society.
