PANIC AND TERROR

CONDITION OF MIND OF EARTHQUAKE SUFFERERS.

Remarkable Instance of Instinct of Self-Preservation—Fear Killed Many—Children Suffered Less Than Grown People.

London, Jan. 22.—Prof. Cesare Lombroso, the alienist, professor of psychiatry at the University of Turin, has written a long article on the state of the minds of the people during the recent Italian earthquake.

He says the recent disaster enables one to sound the very depths of the human soul. He quotes one of the survivors as saying: "I saw the last judgment, the end of the world. I am sure the end of the world must come this way. In the pitch black night I saw houses tremble, shake and subside, abysses open in the earth, endless shrieks and cries. I thought it was the reign of death as I had pictured it in nightmares. I no longer felt alive. I thought myself dead. I thought that my consciousness was the consciousness that must follow death."

Prof. Lombroso continues: "No one though seriously wounded, speaks of physical suffering. Panic and terror took possession of their senses and paralyzed all sense of pain. Men who had an arm broken ran miles without knowing it. A woman whose eye was so badly hurt that it had to be removed, declares she felt nothing. With bare feet and clad only in a shirt, the first thought of the survivors was to fly, and they set off without thought of rest."

"There was a striking episode of collective mutism. Three hundred working people were about to enter a factory; they stayed outside and thus were saved, but their amazement was so great that when the director of the factory called their names scarcely one answered. Their names had slipped their recollection."

Some remarkable instances are given in which the instinct of self-preservation showed itself strongly. Women and children remained for two days sitting on window sills on third and fourth floors with a great drop on either side, and yet they refused to fall a prey to sleep or fatigue. Prof. Lombroso goes on to show that children resisted terror and pain better than adults. This, he says, was due, not only to their remarkable power of resisting suffocation, but also to their unconsciousness of danger and the sensation of fear which certainly must have killed a majority of those who died after being extricated.

He travelled the following circuits, Plainville, Frankford, Clayne, Roblin, Wilton, Wooler, Shannonville, and Hilton. Failing health compelled him to seek suspension last conference, and he has now ceased his earthly ministry. He was an honest, hard-working, effective toiler in our ranks, and his work abides.

JAMES MURPHY DEAD.

Well Known Ogdensburg Merchant Expires.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., Jan. 22.—James Murphy, aged sixty-two years, one of the best known and most successful clothing merchants of this city, died very unexpectedly at the City Hospital, on Wednesday afternoon. He was operated upon two weeks ago and was getting in readiness to return to his home when his heart action suddenly weakened and death followed within a few minutes.

At the age of sixteen he enlisted and served with the 24th New York Cavalry in the civil war. He served four years as an alderman and was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Catholic Mutual Society, Royal Arcanum, Ransom Post, G. A. R., and the Century Club. He is survived by his widow and one son, James T. Murphy.
