IN RAGE USED KNIFE
INSANE CONVICT SLASHES NURSE AND RESCUER.

Guard Fires at Stabber and is in Turn Injured Fatally by Wily Prisoner—Recovery is Doubtful.

Pittsburg, Jan. 27.—One man is dead and two are believed to be fatally wounded as a result of an attack made upon a male nurse by an insane convict patient in the hospital of the Western penitentiary here, yesterday. The dead: John Bulloch, twenty-five years old, a foreigner. The injured: Walter M. Beall, thirty-five years old, of Pittsburg, penitentiary guard, fatally stabbed in abdomen.

Nurse convict, name withheld, by penitentiary officials, stabbed in back and on arm; recovery doubtful.

Bulloch had secreted a table knife in his clothing. While the nurse was bending over a patient, Bulloch sprang at him and plunged the sharp blade into his back up to the handle. The nurse, calling for assistance, turned on his assailant, and although unarmed, was defending himself as best he could. The crazed prisoner was slashing at him again and again with the knife, when Beall, the guard, rushed in and began firing at the madman. Two shots took effect. Beall stopped firing and began to examine the wounded man's injuries, when Bulloch sprang to his feet and plunged the blade into the guard's abdomen. The latter fired twice more at Bulloch and he fell mortally wounded. Beall and the nurse are both alive, but the surgeon holds out little hope for the recovery of either.

OLD SCHOOL DOCTORS
IGNORANCE OF PHYSICIANS OF EIGHTEENTH CENTURY

Torture for the Patients—Every Ailment Beyond Diagnosis Was Classed As a Fever, and Pills, Plasters, Burning and Bleeding Were the Regulation Remedies.

The proverb "The remedy is worse than the disease" must have been coined in the eighteenth century, when physicians treated their patients with a violence that bordered on assault and battery. It was held that sickness was some kind of a demon that must be overcome by pills, plasters, bleeding and burning, and if the patient incidentally got the full effects of the torture, and died, so much the worse for him. Air and water were considered the most dangerous things for a sick person to have, and his misguided demand for them was interpreted as a sign that he should have still less.

The windows were shut and curtains of the four poster tightly drawn around the recumbent unfortunates gasping for breath. If he turned with the fever the blankets were piled on him. A desire for water meant that he could have none, while a lack of appetite proved that he ought to be stuffed with food. A bath was positively unthinkable.

The deadly results of breathing "night air" were accentuated by medical writers, says E. G. Tallentyre in the Cornhill Magazine. All air was bad, and the night quality often proved fatal to young ladies of beauty and grace, and died, so young completeness of parts and breeding. One bold medico recommended that a bed-chamber should be ventilated in the daytime. Another dared to suggest that consumptives might benefit from sleeping in a pure atmosphere. The rule for abstinence was "hands, often, feet seldom, head never," but a physician far in advance of his age surmised that invalids might bathe their feet in warm water once a week and under extraordinary circumstances take a warm bath once a month.

Overeating and drinking caused many of the diseases of the upper classes. Montesquieu said that dinner killed one half of the Parisians and supper the other half. Everywhere it was the custom to pile the table with roast beef, mutton, capons, boars' heads, pasties, creams, stuffings and accompaniments. A fearful repast of twelve indigestible courses was brought on all together, so that the diners knew what was expected of them. A large breakfast of small beer and meats preceded the gigantic mid-day meal, when people enjoyed a Gargantuan gorge for three hours and spent two more in Falstaffian potations. After this the gentlemen joined the women for a dish of tea in the drawing room, and it was not long before the whole party of human anacondas returned to the dining-room for a supper on the gold remnants of the dinner. ARE STILT-WALKING PEOPLE,
Gascon Peasants, Shepherds of Landes, Find Stilts a Necessity.

In some parts of the world, particularly in the low districts of France, stilt walking is a necessity. In Gascony there are great level plains covered with stunted bushes of dry heath. These waste lands have a soil that is so permeable, so soft and yielding that the slightest fall of rain makes them practically impassable by ordinary methods of pedestrianism. But these wastes must be traversed at all seasons by the poor people of Gascony, and necessity has accordingly made the Gascons a stilt-walking people, and men, women and children may be seen at all seasons of the year stuck upon high stilts, trudging through the waste lands, carrying baskets, bundles and the like. The stilts used are about five feet long and often longer.

The shepherds of Landes all go on stilts and they think no more of being perched up from dawn to dusk with their feet on a level with a man's head than Chicagoans do of wearing shoes. The shepherd is provided with a stout staff that answers for many purposes. At the proper place in the staff is a flap, which makes a comfortable seat when turned down. On this the shepherd quietly sits and watches his flock, and while he sits up there he knits or spins with a distaff, thrust in his girdle. The Landes stilt walker can do marvelous things with these five-foot leg extensions. He can run with a speed that will tax a horse, pick up a pebble or pluck a flower as the cow-boy reaches to the earth from his pony, and he can drop to the ground level and regain the perpendicular as quickly as a boy can turn a hand-spring.
