### LUCK WITH PICTION

#### THE 14TH JUNIORS DEFEATED IN BELLEVILLE.

The Score Was 4 to 3—Picton Quite a Heavy Team—The Young Soldiers Scored the Last Three Goals of the Game.

In one of the hardest-fought junior O. H. A. games ever played in Belleville, the 14th Juniors were defeated by Picton, four goals to three, on Thursday night, before seven hundred people. The ice was in fine condition for the game, as it had not been skated on for some time, and the local team left here at noon and spent the hours before the game around Belleville. Picton did not arrive in Belleville until six o'clock.

The game was fast and hard fought. A fast pace was set at the start and maintained until the finish. Picton is a larger, heavier bunch than the soldiers, but are not as good hockey players, and they will have a very hard go to defeat the soldiers in Picton. Had the game been here, Picton would have been trimmed. The ends of the rink instead of being square, pointed like the local one, are round, and this greatly aids a team that is used to them and greatly hinders a team that is not. It took the Kingston bunch all the first half to get on to this point. At that stage of the game the score stood three to two for Picton, and in the last half, when the 14th came back and played hockey the kids made the big fellows from Picton look like mile posts.

In the first half many penalties were handed out by the referee. The checking was close and hard on the players. Picton forward line weighed from ten to thirty pounds each more than the locals, and the defence weigh heavier than that of the soldiers. The sincerest sympathy of all present. The locals simply skated rings around the visiting team, only to have hard luck in their shots. In this half penalties were very liberal, both teams suffering heavily.

Picton have not lost a game yet this season and have a very good seven. They are all tried players, who have played together for several years, thus knowing each other's play from start to finish. The forwards work fine together, using a nice combination, and check back well. Their forwards certainly did not having anything on the locals only in weight and the defence was not any better than the soldiers.

For the soldiers Brouse played a fine game at rover. Time after time "Brouse" would get it handed to him, only to come up again for another, with the same smile on his face. He was accountable for one of the goals. Moran, Gratton and Nicholson played well together, and did fine work. The soldiers forwards have improved a great deal in the past week or two. They are using a far better combination, and checking back like little fishes. The defence, Marchand, Hyland, Sparks, are three good ones, and put up a strong game. Hyland especially played a fine game. All the locals improved twenty per cent. after the half-time rest, and came back to win.

For the winners, Croft in goal, Reid and Ellsworth were the stars. Croft somersaulted with some fast ones that seemed pretty well tagged.

At the start of the game Picton rushed to soldiers' goal, and started a regular bombardment, the rinks' corners putting the locals in hot water. The soldiers defended their nets well for eight minutes, when Hicks landed. After this goal the penalties started. Moran, Reid, Hyland and Ellsworth being retired in order. About seventeen minutes later Hicks found the nets again, and ten minutes after Reid made it three nothing. Just after this the half-time whistle blew. The soldiers put up a good, stiff game, and were not discouraged at the outlook. They were all given a good rub at half time and came back fresh and strong.  
 Shortly after half time Picton scored again, Hicks doing the trick, then followed another list of penalties. After ten minutes play Gratton scored the first goal for the locals, and the balloon went up, the soldiers landing them while the Picton bunch were held to their own four points. From the time that Gratton scored the first goal to the end of the game, the locals did this and that, but the run all the while, and it was just hard luck that left the score four to three, as the soldiers deserved three more at least.

### LADIES WITH KINGSTON.

In Belleville on Thursday night the crowd, especially the ladies, was the largest that has been seen.
