

APPALLING STATE OF OUR MILK SUPPLY.

BACTERIOLOGICAL ANALYSES SECURED BY MONTREAL STANDARD.

Some remarkable revelations are made in the accompanying report of bacteriological analysis of milk samples obtained at random by The Standard's own inspector. When it is remembered that 100,000 bacteria per cubic centimetre -about two square inches-is the limit allowed by most municipalities making any hold effort of milk-supervision the full significance of the figures given will be better understood in their relation to the

According to the figures there are dealers who include a trifle of 80,000,000 bacteria in a quart of milk, For this you pay eight cents, which is a cheap and easy means of suicide, but a rather expensive purchase if you fondly imagine that you are receiving a nutritious and sustaining food.

In the subjoined list of reports, the first column of figures may be taken as the best and fairest guide in arriving at the state of the milk tested. It is based on agriculture at blood heat, the most common method of deciding the number of bacteria to a cubic centimetre. The column showing the percentage of liquefying bacteria is also very important, inasmuch as liquefying bacteria are perhaps the most dangerous, harboring the
