Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section (40 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to extra homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered sections of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Sault Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over may locate a claim 150 feet by 150 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS.—Generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 24 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

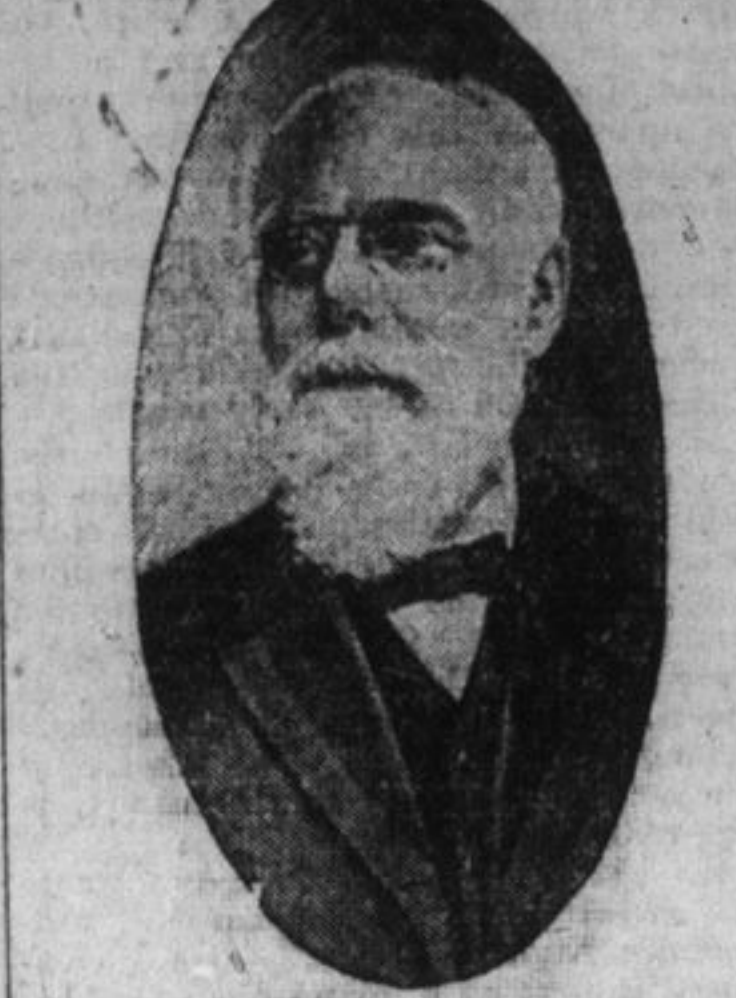

MR. FOSTER ANSWERED TO PAY FOR EXTRA CLERKS IN JUSTICE DEPARTMENT.

The Item of Two Thousand Dollars to Which He Took Exception Was Incurred in Preparing a Return Asked For By Himself.

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—Mr. Foster in the house, demanded particulars as to an item for extra clerical assistance in the justice department. There was an increase of \$2,000 over the previous year's item.

This \$2,000, explained Mr. Aylesworth, represented the cost to the country for last session by Mr. Fos-

ter giving particulars as to the exercise of the pardoning and remitting power during the past few years. The return was tabled in the commons, yesterday. It comprises nearly 700 pages and represents nearly a year's work by special clerks.

The operations of the federal department of public works are detailed at length in the annual report of the department just completed. The report of Deputy Minister Hunter shows that for the fiscal year, 1907-8, the total expenditure was \$11,199,384.94, an increase of \$1,851,999.63 over the preceding year. The items included are:

An idea of the increase is afforded by the fact that in 1897 the total expenditure was \$1,744,654. In 1900 it was \$3,563,026, and in 1904, \$6,492,273. The revenue collected by the department was \$299,430.18, the principal items being slides and booms, \$86,760; telegraph lines, \$121,553; graving docks, \$63,208; rents, \$17,189. The total expenditure for harbors and rivers was \$5,956,063. Of this amount \$3,344,306 was in dredging harbors, etc. Dredging operations in the year cost \$3,344,306. The total miles of telegraph lines, under the department, is 7,225, with 393 offices, transmitting during the year 105,000 messages. The cost of maintenance exceeds the revenue, but the advantage accruing to the portions of the country served by these lines more than compensates for the expense. The benefits enjoyed on the Atlantic by the shipping trade, the fishermen and the signal service, and in the North-West by the settlers and mounted police, are incalculable, while the Yukon line is a necessity to keep that part of the dominion in touch with the rest of the world.

A CONVICT'S SUICIDE.

Roberto Bendetti Hangs Himself in Cell.

New Westminster, B.C., Feb. 3.—Roberto Bendetti, an Italian convict, serving a two-year sentence for unlawfully wounding at Ferpie, nine months ago, committed suicide yesterday, by hanging himself with a belt to a water pipe in his cell. This is the third suicide at the British Columbia penitentiary within three months, and the second in eight days.
