LONGBOAT AND SHRUBB RUN TO-NIGHT.

Longboat Not in the Best of Shape—Marty Walsh Has a Bruised Head—Toronto Comments on 14th.

New York Sun: In comparison as to build, weight and stride, Longboat has it on the Briton. He is 5 feet-11 1/2 inches tall, weighs 143 pounds, and has a stride of 6 feet 6 inches and is twenty years old, whereas Shrub is 5 feet 7 inches tall, scales at 126 and down, has a stride of 5 feet 2 inches and is thirty-one years old.

Shrub has come in with a costume of two miles in training inside of two hours, but has never taken part in a race over the full Marathon distance.

Shrub is a wonderfully fast man for ten or twelve miles, and it is believed that he can run away from the Indian for that distance.

But the Englishman has rather weak underpinning, which may cause trouble in Friday's big race.

Toronto Globe: Tonight "Tom" Longboat meets the most redoubtable opponent he has encountered in his running career, and the long race with Alfred Shrub in Madison Square Garden is looked to as likely to furnish the most interesting contest in years.

The most conflicting reports have come from New York as to Longboat's condition, and here it is generally believed that only a lack of condition would enable his opponent to defeat the Indian.

It was positively ascertained by the Globe that Longboat was decidedly not at his best, when Shrub took the race, and the Indian he was incapacitated by an inflamed toe, and the race was postponed from January 26th. The delay will be greatly in Longboat's favor, though to-night will not see him at his very best.

Still, he is such a running prodigy that he may be somewhat under his best, and beat good men. Rules do not apply to a phenomenon. Yesterday's reports were that both men had finished training, and would come in to New York, today, from the quiet places where their preparation had been done.

"Tom" Flanagan is in New York, and will do what he can in the way of advice to ensure the success of his former protegee, but that will be less for they go on the track. He has refused to act during the running of the race.

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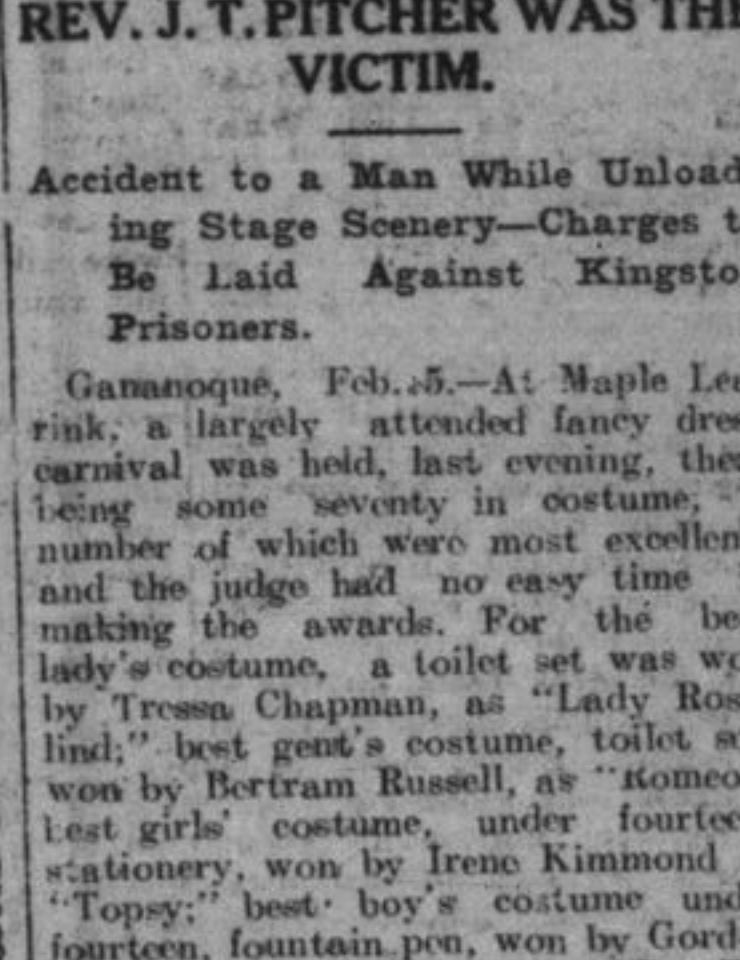
