GREAT WASTE OF TIME IN LEGISLATURE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Member Takes Up a Whole Day, to Tell About His Own Greatness—A Newspaper in Trouble.

Special Correspondence. Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 1.—The seventh day in the provincial legislature of British Columbia, has passed, but like the other six, there has been nothing done that even the most ardent supporters of the government can lay their fingers on, or point to as business that has been transacted.

I never knew an election to pass yet when the conservatives did not have something to spring upon the people at the last moment. It is an old game with them, and yet it seems that they can play it over and over just as often as they like, and there are always some unwary that they can catch. The honest politician should, of course, represent the whole of the people; but how about the wily offer who is lured by such tactics as the above described? Does he represent the whole of us?

In conclusion, I would like to ask as a favor that you keep an eye open down there for anything that our member from Vancouver may do at Ottawa, and if he should be able to keep from dropping his notes upon the floor of the house long enough to connect two sentences, kindly let me know what they are.

Consequently this seventh day was taken up by him, not in the discussion of any measure that was before the house, for there was none, but in telling his listeners how much he had done for the province, and incidentally for the party in the past, and how much more this amounted to than would have been possible with any other man. For seven days the house has listened to this kind of babble; when will they get down to business?

That was a pretty little mess that the Victoria Colonist—conservative, of course—got itself into over that fake telegram, which, undoubtedly, was the means of turning the tables in favor of Barnard, the conservative candidate for Victoria. Not until Sir Wilfrid Laurier made the accusation in the dominion house, that R. L. Borden was responsible for the turn things had taken politically on the Pacific coast, owing to a certain telegram having been sent by Borden to the Colonist, on the eve of the election, did the people know of the fake telegram, as it appeared in the Colonist, read: "Your message received. The conservative party stands for a white Canada, the protection of white labor, and the absolute exclusion of Asiatics." Borden denied having sent such a message, and stated that the following was what he had sent: "Your message received. The conservative party stands for white Canada and absolute protection of white labor."

The Colonist was put "up against it," as the saying is, and it has been very busy since trying to explain how and why it all happened. It has offered several explanations, none of which, however satisfactory they may be to the Colonist, are satisfactory to the people. The Colonist says that it very much regrets the incident, and that the lesson will not be lost. Taken as it means, this would read that the Colonist regrets that it was caught in its dirty work, and the lesson will teach it to be more wily in the future. If the Colonist would come right out and tell us the truth: That it was a dirty tactic characteristic with the conservative party, intended to serve a purpose, which it undoubtedly did serve, as Barnard gained a victory, by a small majority, in the race, which he did not expect to gain. That this is not the first, nor yet the last of which they have shown themselves to be capable, and that they will endeavor not to be caught next time, the public would think just as much of the paper as it does after the explanation and apologies it has tried to make.

Interesting News From the Various Sporting Fields.

Johnson has signified his willingness to meet Jeffries.

Toronto Telegram: Steacy's Kingston juniors are very light, but are speedy and clever, and next year will probably be heard from.

Hamilton Spectator: It was here that Longboat got his first start, just as it was here that the Cafferys and Sherrings were produced. Hamilton is the Canadian home of the long-distance game.

Napanee won and lost in Brockville curling matches. The Brockville rinks were defeated by twelve shots, and the Eastern Hospital won by ten. The Eastern Hospital leads the league with four straight victories.

President J. J. McCaffery received an offer for the franchise of the Toronto ball club from a firm of Toronto lawyers, who are acting for some big league club. Mr. McCaffery replied that the franchise was not for sale.

The Pittsburgh Hockey League closed on Saturday. The season has been a poor one from every point of view, and for half of the short season the league consisted of only three teams. The Bankers have a long lead on the other two.

Mattie Maloney, the amateur champion Marathon runner, of Yonkers, N.Y., has sent in his resignation as an amateur athlete, and has issued a challenge to Longboat for a race in Madison Square Garden for the world's Marathon championship.

The Vancouver Y.M.C.A. basketball team are now on a tour of several United States cities, and have no difficulty in arranging matches across the line. The authority of Mr. Sullivan's A.A.U. counts for nothing on the Pacific coast in actual practice.

Toronto World: The time was ridiculously slow even for a Marathon, and to those who will now persist that Shrubb will surely beat Longboat at ten or fifteen miles it is only necessary to point to the Indian's time for those distances, and next race he'll surely have the advice to go at the faster clip.

The Eastern Hospital of Brockville, maintained their winning streak when they disposed of Napanee in the Central Ontario Curling League series by 35 to 25. Napanee went home with an even break as they won from the Brockville club by 12 shots. The hospital curlers have played four matches, winning them all, and are regarded as likely league leaders.

Vancouver World: The press across the line who think well of Longboat are constantly referring to him as the "American." Now once and for all Longboat has not taken naturalization papers, and never can. Neither can Longboat, like the late Sir John A. Macdonald, utter the historic words: "A British subject I was born a British subject I will die."

In the first place, were the Onondaga to go over to the enemy he would lose his portion of the reserve, which, if cut up, would fetch a pretty price. He would abandon all claim. And again the United States does not recognize an Indian as having any status whatsoever. He can never become an American citizen. So that on the whole he hardly imagines the desire of Mr. Longboat to join the ranks of Uncle Sam will ever be fulfilled.

The two men who battled for it, and made a thrilling spectacle for the 12,000 New Yorkers who crowded the great Madison Square Garden, carried no emblems of the country in which they ran, and there was no chance to cheer for the Stars and Stripes. The one from the north wore the maple leaf, and it was Alexander Muir's song that rang through the building above the frenzied demonstrations of the crowd when the winner was decided. The beaten man wore the Union Jack on the breast of his red jersey, and nobody ever carried it more pluckily against insuperable odds.

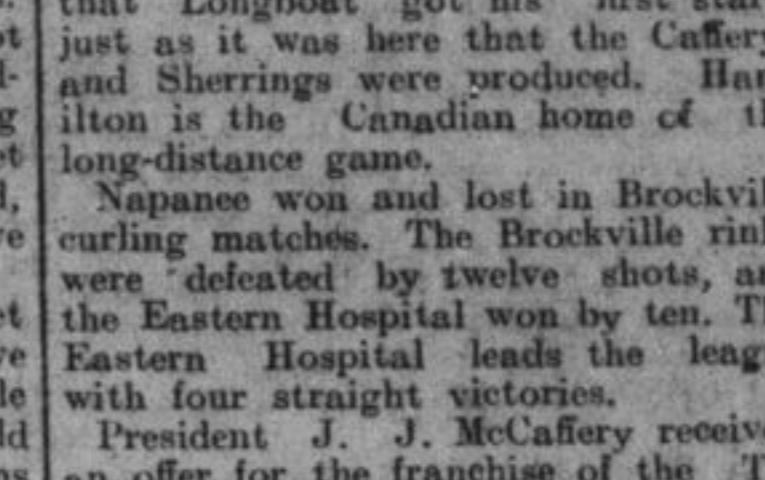
