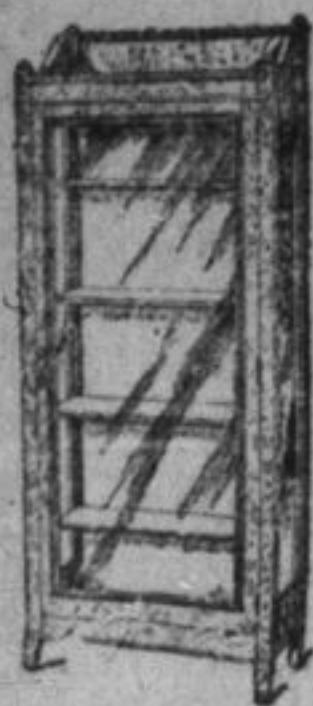

THE SOCIETY CIRCUS

PRODUCED BY A LOCAL COMPANY

In the Grand Opera House Last Evening—The Performance Was Clever, and Was Much Enjoyed.

Those who attended the Society Circus at the Grand Opera House, on Tuesday evening were delightfully surprised and those that missed seeing it will regret it. One would not credit that local amateurs could put on such a performance, and few would believe that the city has so many young men who are quite finished artists in so many different lines.

The first scene was called "Dixie Days," opening with some good old-time southern coon songs that were delightful. Some new and original jokes were cracked by the clever and men, and then a few more songs were rendered. After this came the programme proper, and it contained a vaudeville bill that would do any home in Canada credit. On the programme no names were used, but it is only fair that the people should know who one or two of the star performers were.

Wilson and West were first on the bill with an up-to-date specialty, filled with good, live dope, many good ones being dealt out. "Saw Dow," the Japanese strong man followed, and he was really very clever. He is without doubt a very powerful man, and is of splendid physique.

The main acts during the piece were a high wire turn, acrobats and the Lilliputian family. The first act was put on by Maceo, who, in private life, is George Bews, one of Kingston's best known all-round athletes and who carried a great surprise. The acts that Mr. Bews does on the high wire were never excelled by any performer in this city. He goes over the wire, doing all his tricks with the utmost grace and ease. His act would make good on any circuit.

As acrobats, Thompson and Gibson have it over any other in every way. J. J. Thompson is well known in the city and his work is equally well-known. Mr. Gibson is a student, and has not been seen so much, but he is an artist of high order. During their performance, there was nothing that everyone in the house did not follow with interest. Mr. Thompson also has four youngsters, the McBrook Bros., Farnum and Cook, who are good acrobats, and with their director do some fine work. Their act was greatly enjoyed.

The Society Circus has also one born comedian, one of the best natural fun makers seen here in some time, Leo Singleton, Brock street, who makes one the best always "on the road." His performance was a great surprise to the large audience. He was ably assisted by Lolo, another clever fun maker.

Many other fine acts, including Prof. Light, in his marvellously illuminated club act, were well received and received great applause. The Society Circus could go on tour at any time and play to packed houses.

HELD "SOCIAL EVENING"

Fine Affair Given by Court Stanley, C.O.F.

The members of Court Stanley, Canadian Order of Foresters, held a "social evening," last night, and the lodge room was well filled with members, their relatives and friends. Dr. Bogart filled the duties of chairman in an able manner, and a programme of music and recitations was rendered. Addresses were given by Rev. Dr. MacLayish and Organizer Currie. Twenty-five members have been added to the order since Mr. Currie arrived in the city, a few weeks ago, and the court is in a most flourishing condition. At the regular meeting on Wednesday evening next, eight new members will be initiated.

Inverary Wedding.

At the home of W. J. Arthur, Inverary, on Wednesday evening, February 3rd, his only daughter, Beatrice, was wedded to Ferdinand Holmes, by Rev. Mr. Roadhouse. The wedding march was played by Mrs. F. Ferguson. Frederika Ferguson, the four-year-old daughter of Major Ferguson was the charming flower girl. The bride was attired in cream crepe de chene trimmed with all-over lace, and cream sash. The bouquets were of pink carnations and asparagus fern. About seventy guests were entertained to supper with Major Ferguson as toastmaster. The presents were many, including cheques from a pair of well-pleased fathers. After a round of visits the happy couple will settle at their home in Inverary about March 1st.

Ice Boat Accident.

It happened on Monday evening at Oak Point, seven miles from the city. Three young men received a cold bath, one of them will not soon forget. P. Quinn, Howe Island, and Norris and D. McLeve, of the city, were returning from Howe Island at a fast speed when one of the skates dropped through, throwing McLeve heavily to the ice, injuring him quite badly. The boys went to Mrs. Murphy's, nearby, and stayed for the night, driving to the city next afternoon. Had it not been for the presence of mind they would have had difficulty in escaping from the thin ice. Mr. Quinn was quite ill after being in the water so long.

Sad Case Of Destitution.

A case of extreme destitution was discovered last night of a family living near the corner of Division and Ellice streets. On investigation, it was found that there was neither food nor fire in the house. The saddest part of the discovery was the finding of a baby eighteen months old, without shoes or stockings. Charitable persons have no conception of the suffering there is in the city at present. There are poor but proud people who will not tell of their condition until it is found out by accident.

The Lake Levels.

The United States lake survey reports that during the month of January Lake Ontario fell 3 1/2 inches. It is 18 1/2 inches lower than in January last year, and 2 inches lower than the average January stage for the past ten years. In 1862, it was 23 inches higher, and in 1886 29 1/2 inches higher. In January, 1906, it was 16 1/2 inches lower. During February the lake is expected to rise 2 of an inch.

YIELDED A SURPLUS

THE LIGHT PLANT DID WELL IN 1908.

City Solicitor Says J. M. Campbell is Liable For Defective Gas Tank—Report Given on the Bostridge Damage Case.
 It was made known to the light, heat and power committee yesterday afternoon, that the plant operations during the year 1908 would yield a revenue of over \$4,500 as compared with \$1,400 in 1907. Of this amount \$4,024 was profit on electricity. Gas showed a deficit of \$508. Thus, the net revenue of gas and electricity combined was \$3,516, and this notwithstanding the much criticized reduction in rates made by Ala. Toye in 1907. The year 1908 was recognized as the most critical in the history of the light plant as a civic utility. Now that it has turned out so well, the present year is expected to be a most profitable one, as there will be a greater increase of consumers in proportion to street extensions. However, it is certain that no further reduction in rates will be made for some time, at least so far as gas is concerned.

The committee will hold over the financial report next meeting for consideration, and gave out only the actual result of the year's operations. City Solicitor McIntyre was present and reported upon the case of Charles Bostridge against the city for damages for the death of his fifteen-year-old son, who was killed on the night of October 25th last, by grasping the guy rope of the arc lamp at the corner of Centre and Union streets. It is supposed that the trouble arose by contact between the electric wire and a large tree through which it ran. The committee will have authority to do any tree trimming it deems necessary for the safe conduct of its wires. At present, trees could not be touched by the department. Ald. Rigney said he certainly thought it a chance to make the city good, and department authority to cut trees where danger existed. The department was carrying deadly wires through the city and it should not be hampered in any way in securing a safe passage.

The committee gave the solicitor certain instructions in regard to the Bostridge case. So far a preliminary examination has taken place. At the request of the chairman, the city solicitor gave his opinion as to the liability of J. M. Campbell to the tank. He said that after going carefully into the question, he had come to the conclusion that Mr. Campbell was liable. The solicitor recommended that steps be taken to repair or replace the tank, reserving the right of action against the contractor. Mr. Campbell was supplied with a report of Expert McKay, and also informed that the city was going to hold him responsible.

Ald. Rigney wanted to know if the committee should not give Mr. Campbell a chance to make the tank good, instead of proceeding itself to do so. The solicitor said that could be done, but the city should not give him a free hand to make some tawdry repairs. If he is given such a chance, he should be notified that the repairs are to be completed and the satisfaction of the city's expert. The solicitor was instructed to draw out a statement of the matter for submission to the city council. The chairman pointed out that it wouldn't do to delay too long, for the tank should be completely replaced before next November. A reasonable time will be given Mr. Campbell if he wishes to give the city a satisfactory tank.

On the petition of the British Whig Publishing company for a lower rate, an action was commenced. The sub-committee reported that the regulations of the department would not admit of a lower rate. The Whig, the chairman reported, paid \$1,396 last year for gas and electricity. The committee decided to purchase

6,000 pounds of cable wire, which can now be got at about six cents a pound cheaper than last year. The superintendent was instructed to telegraph the lowest tender offering a lower figure for 6,000 pounds. The superintendent was authorized to purchase what hard coal screenings the plant required, at \$1.75 a ton. Letters were received from W. Munnell, on behalf of the estate of John Gaskin, and from George Sexton, complaining of gas and water escaping into their premises on Place D'Armes. The former declared that the city would be held liable for all damages. The superintendent said that the gas came through the leakage of water from the tank. It was decided to refer the matter to the city solicitor for him to write to the parties that the city was taking steps to have the tank trouble remedied. Davis & Farnum Mfg. Co., of Waltham, Mass., were asking payment of the balance of their account, \$401.69, for the steel work of the gas tank. There is a discrepancy of nearly \$200 between the above amount and that at the credit of the company in the department's books. This will have to be rectified. The Standard publishing company asked for a lower rate for gas and electricity, as it was paying at the rate of over \$800 a year. The matter was referred to a sub-committee for report.

It was decided that hereafter all tenders for supplies should be directed to the chairman. In attendance at the meeting were Aldermen Elliott (chairman), Angrave, Harty and Rigney.

BEGGING ON THE STREET.

Several Lads Are in Habit of Doing It.

There are a number of small boys in the city who are in the habit of stopping people on the street and asking for money. Most of the appeals have been made at night but in a few cases citizens have been "held up" in the day time. This morning a citizen was hurrying along King street when a lad, not more than ten years of age, standing in a doorway, called out after him, in rather a saucy tone, "Say, mister, give us a cent, will yer." The youngster could give no reason for wanting the money, and the citizen, believing that it was just a straight appeal for money, which would go to the very first store for candy, passed along, and the youngster went on his way, no doubt to lay the game on someone else. For some time small boys have been in the habit of standing in front of the theatres seeking alms from the people passing. Just a couple of weeks ago two newsboys were taken in charge by the police for such an offence, and allowed to go with a warning. The lads should be at school but it is a question whether they can go, as they may be among those who are not vaccinated, and if spoken to will tell you this story, at any rate.

Cathedral Ceremonies.

To-morrow afternoon the rector-designate of Kingston and Mrs. Bidwell will arrive from Lennoxville and be very cordially received. At 8 p.m. the ceremony of induction as rector of the cathedral church will take place. On Friday at 11 a.m. the impressive installation as dean of the cathedral and diocese follows. The clergy and church officials of the parishes of the diocese and the ministers of all churches in Kingston have been cordially invited. If the new dean follows the course of his predecessor this courtesy will mean all that the words imply. The communion have never been so nearly in touch as they now are. On Friday evening a reception will be tendered to the Dean and Mrs. Bidwell.
