WITH A BOGUS CHEQUE.

A Young Man Bought a Present For His Sweetheart.

Toronto, Feb. 11.—The desire to buy a present for his sweetheart landed Ernest C. Perry in jail for thirty days. He came up in the police court yesterday charged with writing \$14.43 and an umbrella by hand. He entered a plea of guilty.

The defendant was a very respectable looking young man, and possessed a good reputation. The counsel for the defence told the magistrate that Perry was engaged to a young woman in Weston Ontario.

"Where does the other money come from?" enquired the magistrate. The crown attorney replied that Perry paid for the present with a valueless cheque for \$22.43, and got the cash in change. To a question of the magistrate Mr. Corley replied that it was not a forgery. The cheque bore the name of H. Ferrier, which was a bogus one.

Perry's lawyer asked for leniency on account of Perry's youth and clean record. He produced character references from prominent citizens of Brampton.

"There is too much of that thing for me to overlook it entirely," said Colonel Denison, "but I shall be as lenient as possible under the circumstances, and treat the youth as a first offender. He must serve a thirty-day term in jail."

TO HANG MAY 13TH. Toronto, Feb. 11.—Just before noon to-day Judge Riddell sentenced Walter Blythe, the Canadian Pacific section man, who beat his wife to death at Agincourt to be hanged on Thursday, May 13th, in Toronto jail.

FOUND UNCONSCIOUS. Young Woman Brutally Assaulted by Ruffians. Pittsburgh, Pa., Feb. 11.—Unconscious, shot through the hip and arm, body a mass of bruises, hair bloody and dishevelled, and her clothes torn to shreds, was the condition of Flora Ellsworth, twenty-two years old, a victim of a cruel assault, when found late last night at Shantree, forty miles east of here.

A rigid investigation, which lasted all night, has disclosed no clue to the identity of her assailant. The young woman is employed as a domestic. Early last evening she started from her employer's home along a private road to a grocery store. When midway between the house and the store she was attacked. From the girl's condition it is evident she fought desperately.

When the young woman failed to return to the house in a reasonable time a search was instituted. It was learned she had not visited the grocery store and the searchers, with lanterns, found her lying beside the private road.

The authorities are hopeful the girl may be able to give material information concerning the identity of the assailant should she regain consciousness.

PULLED OUT OF THE SLIP. A Montrealer Met His Death in Buffalo. Buffalo, N.Y., Feb. 11.—George Murray Shearer, Montreal, died in a hospital early yesterday morning. MURDERER EXECUTED

STEFFAN SWYRDA PAID THE DEATH PENALTY

For Killing a Companion For His Money Last April—His Wife Became a Mother Only a Few Weeks Ago.

Brampton, Ont., Feb. 11.—For the first time in the history of Peel county, capital punishment was carried out, this morning, when Steffan Swyrda, who was found guilty of the murder of Oleka Lutyek, was hanged in the jail yard here. Hangman Radcliffe officiated. The scaffold was erected in a corner of the jail yard, hidden from view on two sides by a specially built high board fence, and on the other sides by the stone walls. On the scaffold Swyrda still maintained that he was innocent. The drop fell at eight o'clock, and within five minutes the man was pronounced dead. Only officials were allowed to witness the proceedings.

The crime for which Steffan Swyrda faced the extreme penalty of the law, was a most brutal one. On April 16th last, Good Friday, Swyrda, an Italian, to a bush near Clarkson, and killed the young man for the sake of a small sum of money he had in his possession. Not until some weeks later was the crime discovered, through finding a bullet in the bush. Nobody had seen the murderer committed by Swyrda. His movements, as traced by the detectives, made it almost certain that he was the guilty man. When placed in the witness box at the trial to give evidence in his own defence, Swyrda told a story of Lutyek, going off with another man called "Mike," but no trace of any such man could be discovered. Attempts were made to secure a new trial for the man, but they failed, as did an attempt to obtain executive clemency. Swyrda's wife became a mother only a few weeks ago.

MARINE ASSOCIATION. Condemned Power Development on Navigable Rivers. Ottawa, Feb. 11.—An outstanding feature of the annual meeting of the Dominion Marine Association, this morning, was the condemnation of power development on navigable rivers to the detriment of navigation interests. The Rev. St. Lawrence being specially referred to, a committee was appointed to fight this question before the waterways commission and the dominion government.

The association also registered a protest against the admission of foreign vessels to the coast trade on inland Canadian waters. They will ask the government for an amendment to the act of last session, regarding duties on vessels for repairs, and that all vessels of any tonnage carrying passengers for hire shall be compelled to register and be subjected to all requirements of the shipping act. A further protest against the pilotage tax in Montreal will also be presented to the minister of marine. The association adopted the new bill of lading which incorporates the vessel carrying shall not be responsible for shortage exceeding one-half bushel for one thousand bushels carried, the vessel to deliver all grain on board, except freight upon actual out-turn, and make no claim for any over-run.

A delegation from the Lake Carriers' Association of the United States, consisting of G. A. Tomlinson, Duluth, and H. M. Smith, of the Canada Atlantic Transit company, Montreal, were received by the association, this morning. The delegation co-operated with the association in the matter of the grain bill of lading, and in the interests of the new co-insurance scheme on the great lakes. A delegation from the Montreal Corn Exchange will be received this afternoon. The officers for 1909 were elected as follows: J. Smith, Riebelin & Ontario Navigation Co., Montreal; president; H. H. Gildersleeve, Northern Navigation Co., Collingwood, first vice-president; F. Plummer, Canadian Lake & Ocean Navigation Co., Toronto, second vice-president. Francis King, Kingston, was appointed general counsel for the association.

AT THE ANCIENT CAPITAL. Arrangement Between Government and Bank. Quebec, Feb. 11.—It is stated that the commissioners charged with making the expropriation of the Carrier Laine property at Levis, recently acquired by the Bank of Montreal, have made their report to the government and that an amicable arrangement between the government and the bank in regard to the price to be paid is probable. It is stated that the Great Northern railway company have notified Messrs. Nap Koonce and Fils, of St. Andrew and St. Peter streets, that they intend to expropriate their property in order to construct a freight shed 200 feet long and fifty feet deep for the purpose of the railway.

DR. SNYDER'S FINE. His Friends Pay It, But He Will Present Sum to Hospital. Niagara Falls, Feb. 11.—Dr. Snyder, the United States physician, who was fined \$25 last week for practising his profession in this city, has written a letter to the press in which he states that several of his Canadian friends had subscribed the amount of his fine and returned it to him. Dr. Snyder says he will offer this sum, together with his fees derived from this city until June, to the Niagara Falls general hospital for the endowment of a bed to bear his name. The doctor is a Canadian and graduate of Queen's university.

GREAT EXCITEMENT

At Shelburne Over the Trial of a Crazy Man.

Shelburne, Ont., Feb. 11.—Never in the history of the county of Dufferin was there more excitement than exists to-day over the preliminary trial of G. E. Stewart, charged with the murder of John and James Spanhouse, at their home in Melancthon, at an early hour in the Sunday morning last. People from all over the county are flocking in to town to get a look at the prisoner and to hear the details as given in the evidence before Police Magistrate Rutherford. A large crowd was at the station to see the prisoner but contrary to expectations Stewart did not arrive. It is understood the authorities decided on this course on account of the mental condition of the prisoner. G. M. Vance, K.C., of Shelburne, who is acting for the prisoner, states an effort is being made to have the prisoner committed to an asylum and avoid a criminal trial. Orangeville, Ont., Feb. 11.—George Ernest Stewart, who murdered John Spanhouse and his son in Melancthon township, early on Sunday morning, made two desperate attempts to escape from his cell in the Orangeville jail last night. When two turnkeys opened his cell door to give him his evening meal, Stewart sprang upon them from a corner of the cell and attempted to overpower them. The men after a hard struggle, however, succeeded in forcing him back. Governor Bowles was sent for and on his arrival a second attempt was made to give Stewart his supper for which he was pleading, but no sooner was the door open than he made another rush. He was again forced back, however, and attempts to provide him with supper were then abandoned. J. McKay, county attorney, on being notified of what had happened, decided to take Stewart to Shelburne for trial to-day but to keep him here until his future was decided upon.
