The River Po in Italy was frozen from Cremona to the sea in Wine casks burst and trees split the action of the frost. Loaded wagons crossed the Adri

atic sea on the ice from the land to Venice in 1234. The Danube river was frozen the bottom in 1236 and remained so frozen for a long time.

In order to prevent putrefaction, he places them in sterifized culture tubes, and then he puts away the tubes in large ice-chests, which maintain a temperature just above the freezing point. 
