Kingston, Feb. 15.—(To the Editor:) The agitation for the betterment of the drama is bearing fruit. The Daily Whig of February 12th stated that a meeting of the New York Theatrical Managers' Association would likely be called, and that "several managers were of the opinion that a censorship should be established to prevent objectionable plays."

In the second act, the city fathers set out after the enemy, and a big banner is erected to hold the prisoners. A very pretty closing to—the production, is the chorus, "Love, Love, and Pretty Flowers."

The part of Queen Zenora is ably taken by Phyllis M. Welch, and that of Prince Daniel is given a most capable portrayal by W. E. Manhard. All the other parts were well taken, the singing of Miss Norma Hughes being a special feature. "It would be unfair not to give special mention of the work of William Mack, as "Cholly Jock," A. Goudreau, as "The Kent Major," R. Day as "Patrolman Bob," H. Milne and W. McFederick as "Doc H." and "Christie G." twins, the bear and the organ grinder. The latter's little sketch was well put on. The song and dance specialty of Master Paradis, between first and second act, was exceedingly well put on, and merited unstinted applause. TO ASK FOR \$5,000

To Rebuild the Steamer Wolfe

Islander.

The Wolfe Island council is sending a deputation to Toronto to ask the government to make it a grant of \$5,000 for the purpose of rebuilding the ferry steamer Wolfe Islander.

The deputation will ask that this grant be made in lieu of colonization road grants to the island for a certain number of years, the island to take care of colonization roads itself.

The ferry steamer requires rebuilding, as it is not large enough for Wolfe Island's needs. It is proposed to lengthen it twenty-five feet and make it wider. These additions will make the boat more seaworthy and will also more than double its carrying capacity. At present the Wolfe Islander can carry only 175 people. With the proposed additions it will carry 450 and be a larger boat than the steamer Pierrepont.

The island council, whose reeve is John Spoor, has hopes that its request will be granted by the government.

IT COST \$9,050.04

For the Treatment of Smallpox

Last Year.

City Auditor Miller reported to the city council last evening that during 1900 the board of health had expended \$9,050.04 on smallpox isolation and hospital. That sum is made up as follows:

A portion of this amount the city will get back. All patients who can afford to pay will be billed by the city treasury department. Another month will elapse before this can be done.

(Continued from Page 1). That notification of the matters herein contained be given to Mr. Campbell by forwarding him a copy of the report of your committee as adopted by council.

Reports, By-Laws, Motions.

All the reports of the committees passed with practically no discussion. The waterworks report, recommending the increase of Superintendent Hewitt's salary by \$150, and Engineer Taylor's by \$50, was unanimously adopted.

Mayor Couper called Ald. Angrove's attention to the fact that the city property committee had failed to put up a clock in the council chamber.

Ald. Angrove replied that his committee would include the cost of a clock in its estimates, and he hoped that the mayor's finance committee would see that the money was supplied.

The Wormwith bonus by-law was given a third reading and passed, on motion of Ald. Givens.

A by-law was passed, granting Dr. Hemstock part of the smelter site, under certain conditions, for the manufacture of sulphuric acid.

Another by-law was passed for the extension of Raglan Road to Division street.

This resolution, moved by Ald. Givens, seconded by Ald. Carson, was adopted; that the council of the corporation of the city of Kingston, by the action of the board of governors of the School of Mining, at Kingston, in applying to the board of trustees of the Carnegie foundation for the advancement of teaching for the admission of the School of Mining to the benefits of said Carnegie foundation; that the city council also commend to the favorable consideration of the legislature of the province of Ontario, the endorsement of the said application; that a properly authenticated copy of this resolution be sent to the legislature of the province of Ontario, to the board of trustees of the School of Mining, and that the said board of governors of the School of Mining be requested to consider the same.

Ald. Chown moved, seconded by Ald. Elliott, that the waterworks committee report upon the number and location of dwellings in the city not supplied with water, and the cost of supplying the same. This resolution was well received, as was the question of supplying water to remote parts of the city has long been a debated question.

The law requires that before buildings can be erected every main street must yield eight per cent. revenue. In many places it is impossible to get this percentage, and people cannot afford to pay two and three times what they could pay. Some houses have been laid during the past three years, that haven't paid more than four and five per cent, and debentures could not be issued. In various parts of the city, people are crying out for water, on account of bad wells, and in one locality on account of fever. The resolution of Ald. Chown will bring the matter before the council in the right way. The motion was unanimously adopted.
