HOTEL PROPOSITION TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE CITY COUNCIL

By Walter Telfer, of the British-American—He Asks For Bond
Guarantees of \$100,000 and Will Give First Mortgage.

Walter Telfer, proprietor of the British-American hotel, will present his new hotel proposition to the city council, on Monday evening, and it will be worthy of careful consideration. Mr. Telfer offers to put up a five-story building on the present British-American corner, with a business arcade running through the centre of the block, from Ontario to King street, at a cost of \$175,000, if the city will guarantee the bonds to the extent of \$100,000, and fix the assessment at its present figure. He offers the city a first mortgage on property to form a company of local men; in fact the organization has been about completed, he says, and it includes a number of prominent merchants.

The plans and prospectus are all ready for submission to the city council. They show a fine building for the present British-American corner, with 250 rooms. The brick wing on Clarence street, a most ornamental looking structure, will remain. Then there will be the Frontenac hotel as an annex. In all, there will be about 350 rooms, perhaps more. Over the arcade, is planned a huge banquet or reception hall. The arcade will contain well-equipped offices.

If the city council decides to accept his offer, he will commence the building of the new hotel in September, at the close of the tourist season. For the fall, winter and spring he would have the Frontenac as headquarters, and also be able to use the brick wing of the British-American, on Clarence street. By the summer of 1910 the new hotel would be ready for occupation.

The British-American proprietor claims that his hotel proposition is the best for the city, as it costs the citizens nothing. All he wants is a guarantee of bonds, for which he will give a first mortgage on property that, when completed, will be worth over \$400,000. The location is central, and the business is sure.
