LIEUT.-COL. F. STRANGE

HAS BEEN TRANSFERRED TO OTTAWA.

His Removal is Greatly Regretted. He Has Been Over Twenty-Three Years in the Military Service.

Lieut.-Col. Frank Strange, senior command officer at Kingston, has been transferred to Ottawa, and will be succeeded by Major J. Walter...

Kingston exceedingly regrets the loss of Col. Strange, who has been a leader in yachting, musical and social circles. He has for years been Kingston's leading yachtsman...

musical circles he shone as a tenor, and for some years has been soloist in St. Andrew's church. As the original "Leo" in "Leo the Royal Cadet," he is well remembered.

Lieut.-Col. Strange was born on October 11th, 1865. He entered military life as provisional second lieutenant of the 14th P.W.O. Rifles on October 30th, 1885...

He became second lieutenant on December 11th, 1886; lieutenant on April 7th, 1887. On August 2nd, 1889, he became honorary captain and major on August 1st, 1901.

For some years he was paymaster of this military district. When the Canadian Ordnance Corps was formed on July 1st, 1903, he was appointed to command the 3rd detachment at Fort Henry with the rank of lieutenant-colonel.

GRAND OPERA HOUSE. "The Merchant of Venice" Was Aably Presented.

There was a large and appreciative audience at the Grand Opera House last evening to witness Daniel Ryan and his company present "The Merchant of Venice." Mr. Ryan in the role of "Shylock" showed that he was a close student of Shakespearean plays.

He was so realistic that one would suppose that he was the money-lender himself. His avicious eyes sparkled with vindictiveness when the judge partly decided in his favor, but the rage and disappointment depicted on his countenance when the decision was given against him was terrible.

As he tottered from the court-room, feeble and broken-down, a touch of pity was felt. Mr. Ryan's portrayal of Shylock was the best ever seen here and the plaudits he received were well deserved.

Ann Singleton's "Portia" was a fine piece of work. She read her lines clearly and her acting was all that could be desired. Harriet Duke as "Jessica," Shylock's daughter, and a pretty Jewish maiden, could hardly be surpassed in the interpretation of her part.

Ada Wadsworth, as "Nerissa," did good work. Mr. Ryan was well supported by William Jeffrey as "Bassanio," Karl L. Way, as "Antonio," and George Fisher, as "Lorenzo." The balance of the company in minor parts gave valuable assistance. Mr. Jeffrey's "Bassanio" was particularly good.

The stage settings and costumes were very striking and much admired. To-night the company will close their season with the presentation of that much-talked-of and sensational drama "Salome," which should draw a large audience.
