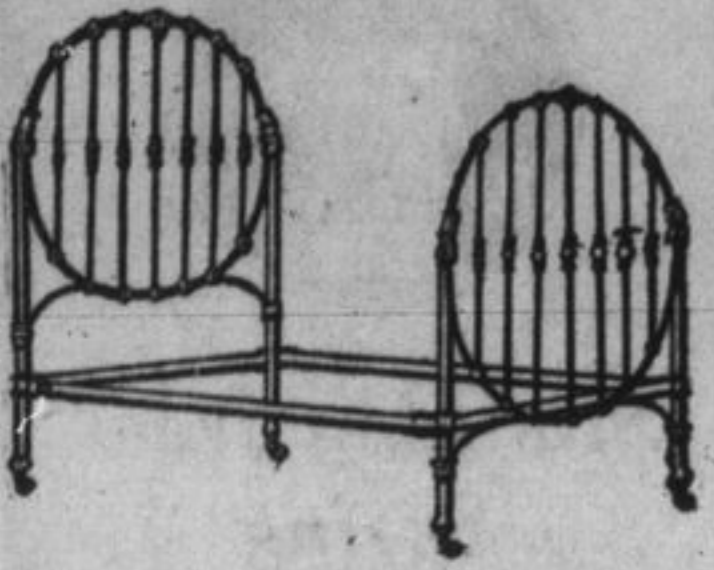


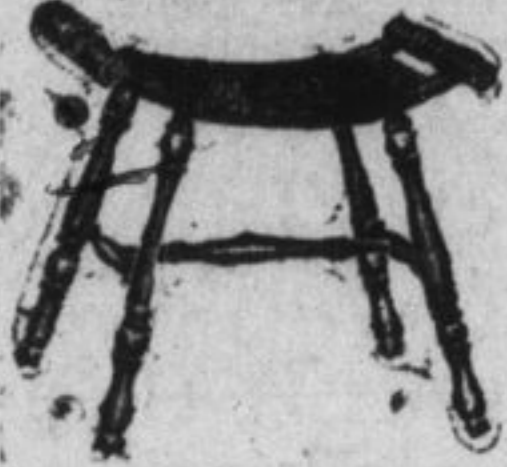

TROUNCED T. A. A. C.

The Soldiers Won the Game by 18 Goals to 6.

Vanhorne Had His Shoulder Dislocated—The 14th Now Enter the O. H. A. Finals With St Michaels, of Toronto.

After the first ten minutes of Monday night's game, between the 14th Regiment and Toronto A.A.C. teams, to decide the tie for senior honors in the eastern section of the O.H.A., the soldiers had a runaway. Richardson scored the first goal, ten minutes after play was started, and from then until the game was called, with the tally-board reading 18 goals to 6, the Kingston soldiers made the visitors look like a bunch of juniors playing their first game.

Wasn't it a shame! Eighteen to six, and before the eyes of fifteen hundred people, too! But, now, mayhap, Toronto will realize that hockey players do grow in other places outside the Queen City. The soldiers have proved their metal, and are now the recognized seven of the O.H.A., who will again guard the senior silverware for twelve months.

The game cost the locals dearly, as one of their best men, in fact, the best cover-point playing amateur hockey to-

day, will, in all probability, be out of the next game, due to an accident. Shortly after play had commenced, before the first goal had been scored, Vanhorne rushed down strong to Toronto goal. He shot, Cosgrave connected, putting the puck to the side, and in going after it Vanhorne collided with Kidd, and went up against the bank. He seemed to have received an injury to his back, but upon examination, it was found that his left collar-bone was dislocated. He was forced to retire for the game. Cosgrave went off to even up. While on the ice, though only for a few moments, Vanhorne certainly made himself felt.

Owing to the Toronto bench not coming down until the evening train, fifteen hundred people were crowded in the rink for over an hour before the game commenced. It was twelve minutes past nine o'clock when "Chaucer" Elliott called the teams to the centre for instructions. The ice was in grand condition. The 14th band was present and dispensed excellent music.

The soldiers played a fine game from end to end. Crawford never played as good a game in his life as he did last evening. His rushes were of the sensational variety, and two of his goals scored on lone excursions were the features of the game. Richardson and Davidson were always on the job. They were easily the best wing men on the ice, and at no time were their marks dangerous to them. Both played a steady, heady game, and their rushes were strong.

"Senator" Powell was the hero of the game in many ways. When Vanhorne was carried away to the field ambulance, "Senator" slowly wiped a tear from his eye, and went back at the game, harder than ever, and as a result he played the best game he has played this season. When the soldiers were playing four men to six, with only Powell and Hiscock on the defence, then did Powell come prominently into view. His rushes were fast and uncheckable, and many a goal was secured after "Senator" had passed it into centre.

Hiscock and Bernier played brilliantly. Bernier was at his old form and showed up exceedingly well. Hiscock was the same old "Eddie," hitting them off all over, without the least exertion.

T.A.A.C. played as well as they knew how. They started as fast as they could, but the soldiers could skate better. The visitors played as good a game as they did here before, only last night it was a clean game, and the soldiers played far better, and that is all there is to it. The Toronto team was simply outclassed, outplayed, outskated, outgeneralized in every department of the game. Allen played a fine game and deserves credit, but he was all alone. Kidd was the star on the defence, his rushes being very effective.

Only one scrap occurred during the

game, and that near the end, when Kidd became too fond of putting his stick into "Senator" Powell's legs. Finally he gave "Senator" a good poke up near the Toronto goal, with the result that he was given a few up-presents, that would make "Jack" Johnson white with envy. This is the second time the Toronto man has got the same dose from Powell for nasty checking.

"Chaucer" Elliott was referee, and that was enough for the Kingston people. They knew they were going to see a clean hockey game, hockey all through, and they did. "Chaucer" missed nothing; everything caught his eye. The teams lined up as follows:
