### A PAINFUL INCIDENT.

Rev. Dr. Shaw's View of Carman-Jackson Controversy.

Montreal Witness.  
"What do you think of the controversy between Dr. Carman and Mr. Jackson, of Toronto?"  
"I think it is the most painful incident of the kind I have ever known." said Principal Shaw. "It is creating a cleavage that is very disastrous. I have perfect confidence in the motive of Dr. Carman. He is as fearless as any man in Canada in the discharge of what he deems his duty."  
"What do you think of the views of Mr. Jackson, which are so challenged?"  
"I would sooner, at present, not express any opinion."  
"Are these views the same as have been the occasion of the Workman incident?"  
"Not in the slightest degree. The points of error alleged against Dr. Workman by our college relate to hereditary depravity, the deity of Christ, miracles, the Bible and the atonement. The only point in dispute raised by Mr. Jackson is the mode of interpreting the opening chapters in Genesis, a far less serious subject."  
"Are his views contrary to the standards of the Methodist church?"  
"I have carefully studied and analyzed these standards, and written a work on their history and contents and relation to other creeds of Christendom, but I know of nothing in them prohibiting an allegorical interpretation of the story of creation and the fall of man, provided the fact of the fall and of sin and of hereditary depravity as taught by St. Paul be recognized. I fancy there have been some unwise utterances of Mr. Jackson which seem to call in question this doctrine of sin. The whole doctrinal system of Christianity in its main purpose of salvation, becomes superfluous if man's universal ruin and guilt be not recognized. I consider this is the main thought in Dr. Carman's mind in his severe treatment of Mr. Jackson. An easy-going view of the story of creation and of sin is most destructive of Christian faith."

### Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 15 years old, may homestead a quarter section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader who lives within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may present a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acre extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered Sections South of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the East line of the third Meridian, and west of the second line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.
