

The present law provides that when gift has been made to a charitable, religious, educational or benevolent institution, and it is found to be insufficient to carry out the purpose of the GIVEN IN THE BRIEFEST PO bequest, the money shall be deposited for twenty-five years, after which the supreme court can determine what use Sir it can be put to in order to carry out so far as possible the purpose of the bequest.

A bill has been introduced by Assemblyman Walters to enable the supreme court in such a case to immediately determine the use to which the bequest could be put, so that the trustee of the fund may be able to carry out the project during his lifetime. The bill is on the order of final passage in the legislature.
