FRACTURED HER ARM

ACCIDENT TO MRS. JAMES TAYLOR, GANANOQUE.

Fire Service Tested By Inspector and Found Unsatisfactory—Squabble Over Erection of a Bathhouse.

Gananoque, March 6.—A serious accident befell Mrs. Taylor, wife of James Taylor, of the firm of Taylor & Green, coal merchants, Thursday evening, having left her home on Stone street to attend the Ladies' Aid social at the Methodist parsonage, Mrs. Taylor walked up to Spyrham street, and the corner slipped on the icy pavement, which was covered with a sprinkling of light snow and fell, fracturing the bone of her arm near the wrist.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Jacques Granger, an ex-mayor of Montreal, has died. Toronto is seventy-five years old today, and still growing.

Ex-Ald. Daniel Lamb, Toronto, has accepted an appointment as a license commissioner.

The trial of the men charged with conspiracy to defraud the G.T.R., is still proceeding.

Montreal Wanderers defeated Renfrew 5 goals to 5 at Brockville on Friday night. The game was for \$1,000, a side bet.

Inspector Hughes and his assistant inspectors will prepare a schedule of Bible readings for use in the Toronto public schools.

What is described as the worst snow-storm of the winter, visited Montreal and points east. Several trains were snowed in, and one is stuck yet.

Mayor Oliver says the changed Toronto car routes "being well engineered by the street railway management" to discredit public ownership.

At Hamilton, on Thursday, Robert Dawson, St. Catharines, aged seventy-eight, and Mrs. Catharine Johnson, Oakville, aged seventy-four, were married.

At Orangeville, the fine windmill elevator of Clarke & Hannah, having a capacity of 30,000 bushels, was destroyed by fire late on Friday, together with 15,000 bushels of wheat.

SHOCKING DISCOVERIES.

Young Girls Have Improper Relations With Chinamen.

It has come to the notice of the police authorities that some of the keepers of Chinese laundries, the names of which are in the hands of the police magistrate, have for some time been having improper relations with a number of young girls from fourteen to sixteen years of age, who have been entertained in back rooms of the laundries in question and given money. This has been going on for some time, but only now have the facts become known, several girls intimate with the sons of the Orient. At least five laundry keepers are guilty. Owing to certain circumstances, charges will not be laid against the Chinamen at present, but if another episode occurs there'll be trouble and a police court case.

The police authorities desire to give this warning to many parents, and impress upon them the necessity of looking after their young daughters. There are too many young girls roaming the streets night and day, without parental control. Many parents are negligent of their children, particularly their daughters, and don't know what they are doing. The Chinese laundry episodes have not been confined to nights, but have occurred in broad daylight.
