#### LONDON CHILDREN FED BY ENGLISH ACTRESS.

Miss Ellaline Terriss Opens Nine Soup Kitchens Providing Food For 1,000 Tots.

London, March 6.—In a quiet but methodical fashion nine "Ellaline Terriss Soup Kitchens" were opened in London yesterday, and over 1,000 hungry little children had a good dinner. The idea originated in the popular actress' desire that something should be done for the mites at present left dinnerness under the London county council's inadequate school meals system.

To save delay and expense and to insure efficiency, the honorary manager of the scheme, Ralph Hall Caine, decided to utilize existing machinery, and to establish the kitchens at the various depots of the London City Mission. Nine of these started work yesterday.

The largest of the kitchens was at Ogle-news Christian Institute, on the

north side of Oxford street, where crowds of little ones were eating soup, containing beef, vegetables and rice. Little faces that had come in showing that child's sadness of the London street, child soon thawed to happiness and contentment. "Eat it up and pass your plate for more," seemed to be the rule, and those who had still "a little room left," acted on the hint, to the satisfaction of Mr. Sparrow, who is in charge of the mission. A tiny girl in a ragged shawl and boots that had burst their sides, though there was little call for laughter, "owned up" that she had "wanted a dinner very much," and that "it was very nice."

As the children left the building they gave "three cheers for Miss Ellaline Terriss," cheers more touching than all the thunders of applause from a crowded theatre.

The supporters of the scheme include the Duke of Westminster, the Duke of Sutherland, Lord Strathearn, Lord Iveagh, Sir Clifton Robinson, and W. A. Horn.

#### WANTED CASH.

##### Payment of Indians For Their Lands.

London, March 6.—The Daily Telegraph publishes the following account of the payment of Canadian Indians for their lands.

"Wealth has suddenly come to the French River Indians through the sale of valuable timber on their lands near Lake Nipissing, Ontario. For many years the late chief of the Ojibways sternly repulsed the advances of the lumbermen, but his son has yielded to their solicitations, and it is stated that altogether the band will ultimately be entitled to something like £200,000. The distribution of the first instalment to the tribe was made by Indian Agent Cockburn at Sturgeon Falls. The assembled braves listened stolidly to the explanations of the agent that the piece of paper that each received meant that a large sum of money was in the Quebec bank to their credit which could be obtained when required.

"A short lecture on banking and the convenience of the savings department followed, after which the recipients marched solemnly to the bank and drew the face value of the cheques. Burdened with wealth they returned to the agent's office where each Indian piled his money on the table and joyfully regarded the stacks of green backs which meant ease and comfort for some time to come.

"One Indian insisted on having bills of small denominations and was loaded up with a mountain of greenbacks. With a grin he staggered into the office, money bulging out of every pocket. Slowly unpacking himself he piled his treasure on the table, making a bigger display than any of his red brethren, which afforded him the greatest satisfaction.

"With difficulty the men were dissuaded from carrying off their money to the reserve, twenty miles across Lake Nipissing, but finally after making generous purchases and paying their bills, nearly all deposited their wealth in the bank. It is stated that the sale will mean an income to some families of £600 per year.

#### SECRET CODES RECOVERED.

##### Lucky Find of Signal Books Thrown Overboard.

London, March 6.—For many a day his majesty's handy man will tell the story of how a diver recovered a box of lost secret signal books and codes from the depths of the sea off Torbay. The books and code had been thrown overboard, and their recovery was of the utmost importance as otherwise it would have been necessary for the admiralty to at once have issued a revised signal code for the whole of the service. As it is, a diver's pluck, assisted by good fortune has resulted in the valuable articles being restored to the cruiser Diamond, to which they belonged. The box was cast into the sea during the visit of the channel fleet to Torbay, and was responsible for the detention there of the cruiser Diamond, after the fleet had left Portland, owing to the anchorage in Torbay not being safe for a large number of ships to lay at with strong easterly winds and a heavy ground swell. At the time no reason was assigned for the Diamond not accompanying the fleet although it was considered remarkable that the ship should have been left in Torbay. The night after the departure of the fleet, Vice-Admiral Sir A. R. Milne, acting commander-in-chief of the channel fleet, gave directions at Portland for divers from the Hibernia and London to proceed on board the Commonwealth, in order that the three ships might furnish a diving party for work in Torbay, but with what particular object was not stated. The Commu-

wealth duly arrived at Torbay, and it was then ascertained that efforts had been made to recover a box of signal books and codes from the Diamond, but without success. The box it was stated, had been thrown overboard by a member of the ship's signal staff, who had suddenly lost control of his senses and committed the act whilst in a state of frenzy.

## TWO FAMOUS FAMILIES CAUGHT BY THE GRIP-- RELEASED BY PE-RU-NA.

### ROSEBERY'S HEIR IS ENGAGED TO WED.

Lord Dalmeny, One of England's Most Eligible Bachelors to Become a Benedict.

London, March 6.—It is announced that Lord Dalmeny, M.P., Lord Rosebery's heir, is to marry Miss Dorothy Grosvenor, the younger daughter of Lord Henry Grosvenor, uncle of the Duke of Westminster. Lord Dalmeny is twenty-seven and Miss Grosvenor is nineteen.

Lord Dalmeny is looked upon as one of the most eligible bachelors in England. He is the heir to a great title and great wealth, for, in addition to the large family estates of the Primroses, his mother, who was daughter and heiress of Baron Meyer Rothschild, brought her husband a very large fortune, which included Mentmore Towers, a magnificent seat in Bucks. In addition to worldly wealth, Lord Dalmeny inherits the prestige of his father's political reputation.

Lord Dalmeny himself has no great political ambitions, and has just admitted that the pace of the liberal party is too hot for him and that he

will not again contest Mintoian—Mr. Gladstone's old constituency. But he is a famous cricketer, an ex-captain of the Surrey County Club, and, like his father, has a weakness for the turf.

Lord Henry Grosvenor is one of the many uncles of the Duke of Westminster. The marriage will mean the alliance of two famous houses on opposite sides of politics. The Grosvenors are unionists. Lord Henry was unionist candidate for Northwich once, and was political private secretary of W. H. Smith when he was first lord of the treasury. The Duke of Westminster is a staunch unionist, while his mother is the wife of George Wyndham.

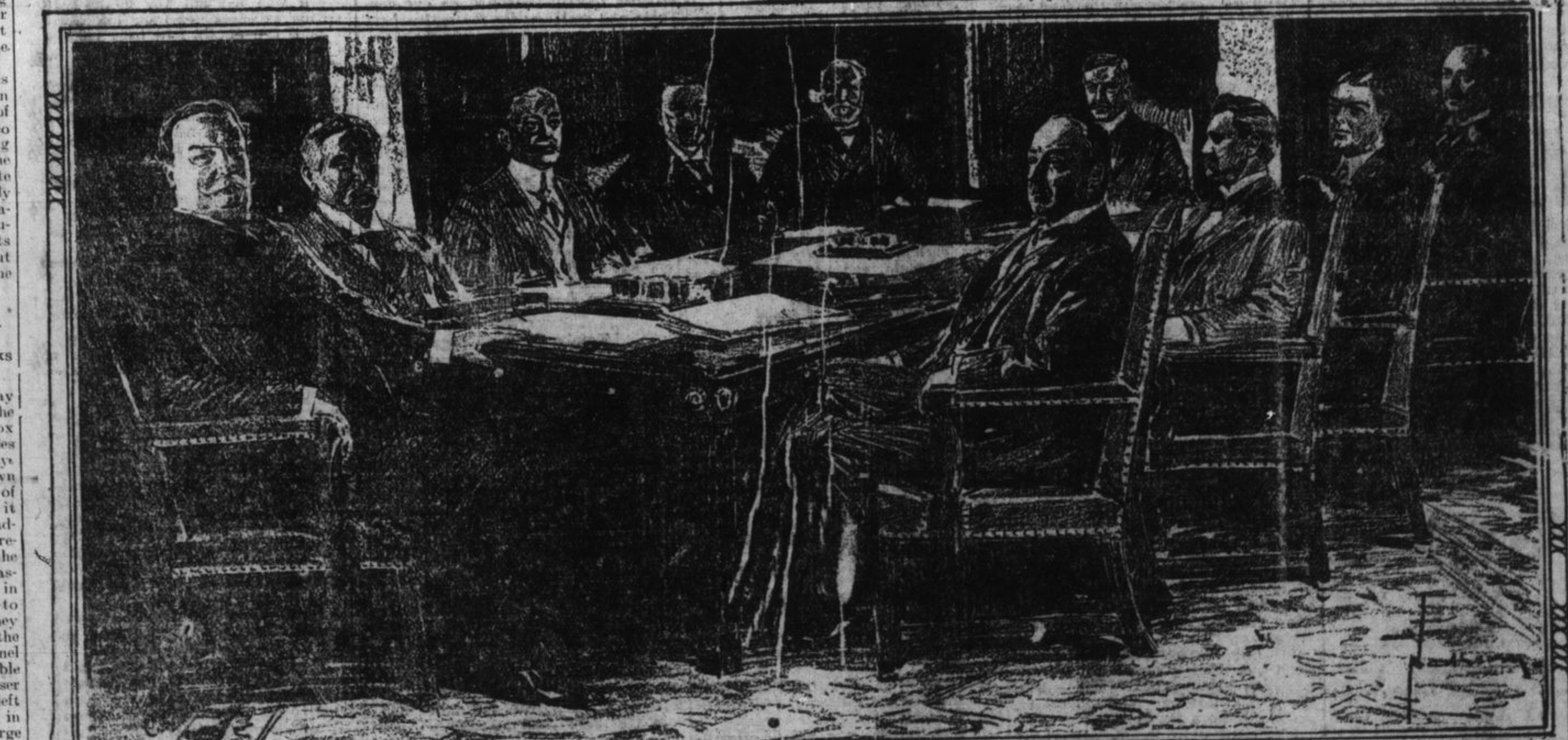
