QUEEN'S HOCKEY TEAM

BRIEF SKETCH OF THE SEVEN PLAYERS

Who Defeated Cliffside in Ottawa and Won the Montague Allan Cup—All Are Fine Players.

The following seven men are accountable for the bringing of the Allan cup to Kingston:

Daniels, the "hunk" tender, is a freshman at Queen's, and so has three more years to play. He certainly was a "find," and has played grand hockey all season. He never loses his head for a minute. He has pulled Queen's out of some rather tight corners by his fast work in the nets.

At point the giant form of "Hughie" Macdonnell is seen, and any who come within reach or happen to bump into him, know that they met something Macdonnell is the best point player Queen's ever had, and is also the best point playing intercollegiate hockey to-day. He is an aggressive player, always in the game, and always on the ice. He plays clean, but hard, has no hesitation in using his body. His rushes are always fast and effective. He is a Kingston boy born and bred, and has represented Queen's in hockey and football for four years.

Pennock, at cover-point, is a peach. He always played a good game of hockey, but never in his career has he played the game he has this season. He has not had an off-night this year. Pennock is also a clean player and seldom decorates the side line, as he believes that one player on the ice is worth a dozen on the fence. Pennock can break up a rush and get away with the rubber faster than any cover-point Queen's has had since the days of the late Dr. Ward Merrill. He not only successfully breaks up the rush, but nearly always carries the puck away with him.

Gregg George has just completed his first year as rover for the champions. He played wing last year, but this season was switched into centre ice and evidently made good. He possesses loads of speed, is tricky and a deadly shot.

"Buck" Crawford, another Kingston boy, plays centre, and needs no eulogy. His playing speaks for itself from start to finish. "Buck" has played for Queen's, in both hockey and football, for three years, and has always made good. His work this season has been as fast and effective as other years.

Dobson holds down left wing, and holds it down in a way that very few other men who have ever worn the tricolor have done. He is fast, exceptionally fast, an expert stick handler, and one who shot "Dobby" is another man that firmly believes in playing a clean game, and it is very seldom he is on the fence. Dobson is easily the best left wing in the intercollegiate. Later on he will be heard from a Presbyterian pulpit, for he is to be a sky-pilot.

Campbell, but not least, comes "Curly" Campbell, the man who scored the winning goal, for his team. "Curly" is a good one, has a style all his own and is fast enough to carry it through. His lone rushes, generally followed by a score, are the sensation of every game he takes part in, and from the reports of Monday's game, he certainly got in one or two in Ottawa last night. "Curly" has played hockey and football for three years, and still has another year to play for old Queen's.

SOME NEW WITNESSES

WILL TESTIFY IN THE MURDER CASE.

The Drain Pipes Are to Be Opened Up—What Would Likely Have Been Done Elsewhere.

Hamilton, Ont., March 16.—Detectives Coulter and Blackley went to the Kinrade home, this morning, in company with some sewer men hired by the city. Their intention was to dig up the sewer and find the traps, the idea being that the revolver, with which the murder was committed had gone down the inside plumbing until it reached the trap, where it could not pass. On account of the storm no digging was done, and the operation has been postponed until this afternoon or to-morrow morning.

Detective Miller made the positive announcement, this morning, that there would be several new witnesses at the inquest on Friday night next. He will not state what these witnesses will testify to.

Would Have Enquired Closely. Detroit, March 16.—Chief of Detectives McDonald, one of the best known and most efficient police officers in the United States, discussing the Kinrade murder case, last night, said if the murderer had been committed in Detroit the mystery, in his opinion, would be far nearer a solution than it is at the present. Under the circumstances, as they existed, the principal parties would at once have been critically examined.

GROSS PERSONAL SLANDERS.

Newspapers Worrying the Asquith Government.

London, March 16.—It is impossible to ignore altogether the series of gross personal slanders connected with the British cabinet, which has filled both the political and social world for weeks past. Hon. David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, twice sought vindication in the courts when reckless newspapers published ill-deserved allusions to himself. In each case the newspaper proprietors made ample apologies and paid considerable sums to charities of the chancellor's designation. These developments, instead of checking, serve to increase it and make it more circumstantial. One reason for this is the feature of the English libel law, which makes the truth of such allegations no defence for their publication. Mr. Lloyd George must realize that this stringent provision works to the disadvantage of a man seeking vindication, because every traducer he prosecutes has no resource but to throw up his case. The same scandals which are not likely to get into print, poison the air, and altogether the life of the present government is not a happy one.

At Winnipeg, for refusing to pay a judgment for \$5,654, entered against her, Mrs. Stevenson has been sent to jail.

Frances Cobartado, found guilty of attempted murder, attempted to commit suicide in Montreal jail, this morning.

James Connee, Thunder Bay, was elected chairman of the special parliamentary committee on mines and minerals.

The outlook for a settlement of the difficulty between the Dominion Steel and Dominion Coal companies, is regarded as hopeful.

Richard B. Vandresar, an old citizen of Alexandria Bay, N.Y., died on Wednesday, after a long illness, aged eighty years.

Adrian Bertrand, accused of biting the ear of Dolor Carpenter, at Gracefield, Ont., was sentenced to twenty-four hours imprisonment.

Capt. A. E. Williams, special agent of the Intercolonial railway secret service, who recently resigned, has rejoined the Thiel detective service.

An estimate of the value of building operations in sight, to date, for the coming summer, in Montreal, totals seven and a half millions of dollars.

The G.T.R. is shipping 3,500 tons of ice from Clark's Island, on the St. Lawrence, to Michigan, to assist the short supply in the middle west.

At Belleville assizes Mrs. Diamond, Campbellford, recovered \$6,500 from her husband as alimony for desertion and unfaithfulness.

Martin T. Looman, Albany, N.Y., under indictment in several cities for daylight robberies, was sentenced to Auburn prison for ten years and two months.

Miss Ethel Barrymore, the actress, and Russell Griswold Colt, of Bristol, R.I., son of Col. Samuel Pomroy Colt, Boston, were married on Sunday in Boston.

The Pennsylvania Steel company, one of the independent steel companies, has announced a reduction in wages, approximating ten per cent, effective April 1st.

Pallas and Daves, arrested for robbing the poor boxes of Roman Catholic churches in Toronto, were sentenced each to six months in the Central prison.

At Madison Square Garden, New York, Monday night, Dorando beat Hayes at the Marathon "distance" by half a mile. The Italian's time was 2:48.08.

The department of railways has heard nothing of the frauds in regard to the weighing of freight on the Intercolonial R.R. Such a thing is hardly possible.

Bishop Dumoulin, Hamilton, who preached the Lenten midday sermon in St. James cathedral, Toronto, today, scathingly criticized the suffragans of England.

Martin T. Graf, alias Monroe, alias Brown, of Buffalo, arrested in Toronto, on a charge of selling immoral pictures, was arraigned in the police court and remanded.

A resolution was moved in parliament by Mr. Monk declaring in favor of the principle of proportional representation, and urging the appointment of a select committee to investigate the subject.

Boys being initiated into a society in Dunkirk, N.Y., were branded with acid on the cheeks, disfiguring them permanently. Complaint has been made to the authorities.

William Ledworth and Albert Sulkey were arrested in Rochester, N.Y., for arson and the police breathe freer, hoping incendiarism has been abolished in the city for a time.

Mr. and Mrs. Moses Russell, Moira, N.Y., have 256 living descendants, thirteen children, ninety-nine grand children, 139 great-grandchildren and five great-great-grandchildren.

At Louisville, Ky., sick and weak from hunger and exposure, fifty Italian laborers were found by the police. They were deserted by agents who promised them work after paying \$2 each at Indianapolis.

A pleasant event occurred at Cherry Valley on March 10th, when Miss Abbie Moore, daughter of James Moore, Point Peter, was united in marriage to Arthur Welbanks, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Welbanks, Point Milford.

H. Carpenter, Winona, Ont., has received word that the will of Mrs. Drysdale has been declared valid by the supreme court of Louisiana. This woman was Mr. Carpenter's step-mother and while she was visiting him she made a will leaving a certain portion of the estate to his family. The estate is worth \$20,000 minus what the lawyers have got out of it in fees and law costs.
