READY TO CONTEST

**QUEEN'S NOT OPPOSED TO
PLAY ST. MICHAEL**

Providing Good Ice Can Be
Secured—Dr. Jock Harty's
Opinion—Queen's Team For
Next Season.

It is understood here that Queen's would not be adverse to having a contest with St. Michaels, of Toronto, for the Montague Allan trophy, now in the possession of the collegians. Much would depend on the weather and the attitude of the trustees who think it highly improbable that any more cup matches can be played this year. Besides this the trustees want two matches, hereafter, to decide the cup holders. It was only to accommodate Queen's that the sudden death game was agreed to owing to examinations hastening on. To have played two games at Ottawa would have meant five days of lost time. If Queen played St. Michaels here the players would be able to do their work at college as usual. If the games are not arranged for this year Queen's will likely go against St. Michaels next January. THE HORRIBLE TRAGEDY
In the Windsor Station at Montreal, March 17.—A revised list

of the dead shows the wife and twelve year old daughter of W. J. Nixon, a train dispatcher, are dead, and an eighteen-year-old son is missing. The family were in the waiting room, waiting for Mr. Nixon, a passenger on the incoming train. He got off to find his loved ones mangled and his boy nowhere to be found. Craig is the name of the fireman but so far he has not been found. The conductor and brakeman claim they did all they could to stop the train when they found it was not slowing up for the station, but failed as the emergency brakes did not seem to work.

The body of the Nixon boy has just been taken from the ruins, at Windsor street, making the third victim of the one family. It is said that the body of another woman can be seen under the wreckage but has not yet been reached.

The rescue work is feverishly proceeding. It is momentarily feared the engine may crash through the floor, and warnings have been placed about the building. Two Caughnawaga Indian girls had miraculous escapes. They were lifted by the cow catcher and tossed to the other side of the room, but escaped practically uninjured.

THE PARKS COMMITTEE
Wish to Make Another Entrance to

City Park.
The parks' committee met, yesterday afternoon, and decided to ask the civic finance committee for \$2,000 for the season's work. Last year the committee had to get along with \$1,000, outside the superintendent's salary of course. That was a very small amount with which to keep five parks in order. In attendance at yesterday's meeting were: Ald. Kon (chairman), Carson, Clugston, Tweddell, McCartney and Hong.

It was decided to increase the salary of Superintendent Phillips from \$550 to \$600. The increase is well deserved. The matter of purchasing shrubs, plants, seeds, etc., was left to the chairman and the superintendent.

The chairman said that a driveway entrance to the city park should be constructed at the corner of King and Barrie streets. Such an entrance had long been needed. The cost would be \$206.80. The committee decided to place this amount in its appropriation request. The sum of \$50 will also be asked towards the cost of work at the drinking fountain to be placed in Clarence street park, chiefly for cementing.

CANADA USES HER FURS

And That is Why the Exports
Have Decreased.

In reference to United States Consul Van Sant's report, which appeared in Tuesday's Whig, regarding the decrease in the exports of raw furs to the United States, from Canada, a Whig representative called at the John McKay Fur House to obtain Mr. McKay's views on the matter, and learned that for the past four years, the demand for fine Canadian furs has been so great that they have, with the exception of a few kinds, been used in Canada, and ninety per cent. of those left have been exported to the London market, which means they would not show in the United States consular reports.

An interesting fact in connection with the above, is that the John McKay factory used over \$20,000 worth of Canadian furs last season, and shipped one consignment of 33,000 muskrats, destined for the London sales.

TIS ST. PATRICK'S DAY.

Pontifical Mass Held in St. Mary's

Cathedral.

St. Patrick's day was observed in St. Mary's cathedral, this morning, by the celebration of pontifical mass, Archbishop Gauthier being celebrated. Rev. Father Menzies was high priest, Rev. Father Hanley deacon, and Rev. Father Meagher sub-deacon. A fine sermon on the life of St. Patrick was preached by Rev. Father Halligan. There was a large congregation present, and the music was of a special nature.

The flags on the city buildings and on Irish halls floated in honor of the day. The only local celebration will be at the Grand Opera House, this evening, when David Ryan and his fine company will present an Irish play, under the auspices of the local Irish Catholic societies.
