

## LATE EDWIN W. MAKIN

## AN OLD RESIDENT OF KING STON TOWNSHIP.

Died at the Age of Eighty-One Years—Born in England, But Came Here When One Year of Age.

The late Edwin W. Makin, of King-ton township, was born in Coventry, England, in 1828, and came to Canada when only a year old and settled with his parents on a farm between Sunbury and Battersea. After a short school education, he became interested in farming and engaged in the profession both in this country and on the United States side for a few years, prior to buying the farm he occupied for upwards of sixty years.

When he first settled on the farm the township was just in its primitive state, no roads or improvements, as there are at the present day. The neighbors were also few and some distance apart. The farm upon which he lived was not much improved when it was purchased, but by steady hard work in a few years he had the larger part under cultivation, and also assisted in helping to clear other farms adjacent, and could tell many interesting tales in connection with cutting wood, logging, etc. The first year in farming, he decided to take himself a helpmate and married Eliza Jane Hawkey, the only daughter of the late Robert and Jane Hawkey, who had shortly before come from Cornwall, England, and had settled a short distance away from his home. The result of the marriage was eight of a family, four boys and four girls, of whom seven are living: Edwin, at Moscow; Mrs. R. Flindell, Lovett; Mrs. Joseph Vanness, Gladwin; Mrs. J. W. Baker, Millhaven; Thomas, at Ida Hill; Samuel on the homestead, and William near Lombardy.

A religion deceased was a Methodist and an active church-worker for over forty years, holding the position of Sabbath school superintendent, class-leader and conductor of prayer meetings in the village school house, for years, and in early life his house was thrown open for preaching for a number of years prior to the formation of a church society in the locality. For the cause of temperance he was one of strongest workers county ever produced and advocated its principles on every occasion he had the privilege to do so. An instance will go to show the principle he advocated. After farming a few years he was in a position to erect a barn and when asking for assistance to erect the same he received a reply from a number that if he did not have liquor there they would not come and the building would not go up. His reply was, "I will not have any whiskey there," and notwithstanding the threat made the barn went up and was gotten through with early. His disposition was a marked and kindly one and was charitable in many ways and it has often been said that no stranger was ever allowed to depart without a meal.

The late Mr. Makin was a man of unusually strong constitution and vigor and was apparently a stranger to sickness until well advanced in years when an attack of grippe brought on heart failure and through his indisposition of some two years he bore it with the greatest patience and was always found in cheerful mood until the end came on Monday evening, March 8th, when he died with a Christian's brightest hope to meet his Heavenly Father whom he so faithfully served. He was the last survivor of the family, his sisters and brother dying previously. His funeral took place on March 11th and was largely attended. Rev. Mr. Shorten conducted service at the church. The remains were interred in the Sand Hill cemetery, the four sons acting as pall-bearers.

## A Mission At Westport.

Westport, March 16.—Rev. Father McPhail, assisted by another member of the Redemptorist Order, is holding a mission in St. Edward's church this week. It is some years since Father O'Brien, S.J., Montreal, conducted the last mission here about eight years ago. Miss J. ## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section (160 acres) or more of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Office or Agent of Sub-Agency for the district. Entry fee may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or wife, and their children.

**NOTES.**—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within the same on his homestead and a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or wife, and their children.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Premium paid for each month's lease of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cutties fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in a certain district for \$3.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd or even numbered Sections, South of township 40, East of the Red River, and Edmonton, Rockwood and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the S.S.R. Railway line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each year and cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.

**NOTES.**—CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-five years at an annual rent of \$1.00 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARRIES.—Persons eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or part of the Mining Record. When \$500 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLATINUM.—Platinum may be leased for 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of ten years. Rent \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2% per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.
