THE QUEEN IS ILL

SUFFERING FROM EFFECTS OF ACCIDENT AT MESSINA.

Examination Reveals That One of Her Majesty's Ribs Was Broken During Panic in Hospital Shortly After Earthquake.

Rome, March 19.—Queen Helena is still suffering from the effects of her accident at Messina during the days immediately following the earthquake.

An unexplained rise in her majesty's temperature led to a careful investigation, and it was found that one of her left ribs was broken. She is being cared for assiduously, but she is to-day obliged to carry her arm in a sling. Her pluck and endurance have aroused widespread admiration. The queen was hurt at Messina early in January. She was at one of the improvised hospitals when she was knocked down by a terror-stricken woman who was trying to force her way through the door of the building with the purpose of committing suicide. The impact was so great that her majesty suffered a commotion of the lungs, but even so the accident was not considered serious, and she was thought to have completely recovered.

NEW IDEA OF EDUCATION.

Expressed By Capt. A. T. Hunter, of Toronto.

Toronto Star.—When we hear that \$100,000 is going to be spent on servants' quarters in Kingston Military College we turn to the permanent corps and look over two very smart bodies of men—engineers, supposed to be composed of artisans, and the Army Service Corps, also recruited as far as possible from artisans—and with Portland cement as cheap as it is, and all these well-drilled artisans, eating up our courses of instruction and our camps of instruction—we wonder if these fellows cannot build a servants' quarters in time of peace, how the devil could they build a fortress in time of war.

Now, as it is had criticism in military matters not to suggest a definite remedy. I shall make a suggestion to our military authorities. The minister of militia must know that the military situation of the non-permanent officers of the militia is a ludicrous burlesque, that all the training they owe to the government is what would be nearly enough to qualify a fairly good sergeant. It is true that sporadic attempts have been made by well-meaning permanent officers, as when Gen. Otter started the Tactical Society, which has died a natural death under his successor. But in general all we non-permanent officers see of the permanent is when they come to limit the moths in our armories, or we go to disturb the spiders in Simcoe street looking for our long-overdue checks.

That college at Kingston is no doubt as strictly run as a monastery, and is quite as useful to the Canadian militia. It qualifies, I believe, four officers per annum for the imperial service. But among the large body of officers that every year require to be qualified to fill vacancies in the city, and rural corps the results of Kingston Military College are less than none.

Now, my suggestion is one that in five years would produce a stream of really qualified officers in Canada. You know that in our universities every student is plagued with what are known as "compulsory options." Thus once upon a time I accepted as an inevitable evil a course in "Mineralogy and Geology," and took a feigned interest in "Chapman's Scale of Hardness."

Could I have been allowed a first course in military history or strategy, or tactics, I should have jumped at the chance. And there are 4,000 students at Toronto alone who might do likewise. Now, the universities would gladly establish such courses if the militia department would pay for them, because it would mean that in fifteen years the active militia would be behind the universities. My suggestion, then, to the minister of militia, is that instead of spending that \$100,000 on buildings at Kingston, he take a hammer and break up Kingston College and attach the professors thereof to the various universities of Canada.
