THE TURN TOO SHORT

In the G.T.R. Plan of the Proposed Subway.

Should the railway commission decide that a subway shall be built at the Montreal Road crossing, the present plans as prepared by the G.T.R. company will not be accepted by either county or city, for the reason that the subway as proposed contains too sharp a turn at the south-east entrance—the one nearest the city.

Councillor Rankin, chairman of the county roads committee, says that the county will certainly refuse to agree to the present subway plan.

It is estimated that the cost of building a subway at the present Montreal street crossing, under the six tracks, would cost about \$45,000, as against \$30,000 for the one proposed by diverting the roadway east.

When City Engineer Craig and Prof. A. K. Kirkpatrick reported six weeks ago to the city council concerning the G.T.R. subway plan they criticized the sharp curve and recommended that the turn be made at a greater angle.

CHRIST WAS A CRITIC

OF MANY OF THE OLD TESTAMENT BELIEFS.

Rev. Dr. Macgillivray Shows That Higher Criticism Prevailed in Early Bible Times—Search the Scriptures, Christ's Command.

In Chalmers church, last evening, Rev. Dr. Macgillivray showed that Higher Criticism is not a modern growth, but existed from early Bible times. He proved from the Bible itself that its early writers were higher critics, that the prophets were the same, that Jesus Christ himself cast aside ancient laws and formulated new ones, based upon the old, and that the apostles followed in his footsteps.

Higher Criticism is but the earnest search for the truth, the prophet said, and, therefore, those who prefer the old and those who prefer the new methods of Bible research and interpretation should observe a fair and kindly bearing towards one another.

Dr. Macgillivray showed that the writer of the book of Job gave a different interpretation of retribution than the writer of the book of Judges. That of the latter was criticized, and for the reason that there had been a growth, an expansion in ideas. Here was a case of Higher Criticism. Then Christ Himself was a Higher Critic.

The apostles likewise continued the work of criticism. They used the Old Testament in their ministry, but sounded a new note entirely. They rejected the old beliefs. The old was not completely overthrown. It was still there—the new had simply come out of the old.
