Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 16 years old, may homestead a quarter-section (160 acres, more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. DUTIES.—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may file within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in others, section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a second section, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Purchased homesteads may be acquired on any available lands on either odd- or even numbered sections South of township 45, East of the Calgary and Edmonton Railway and the West line of range 26, and West of the third Meridian and the Salt River line. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. QUARTZ.—A prospector fifteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended, or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre. CLAIMS.—A prospector may locate a claim 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.
